

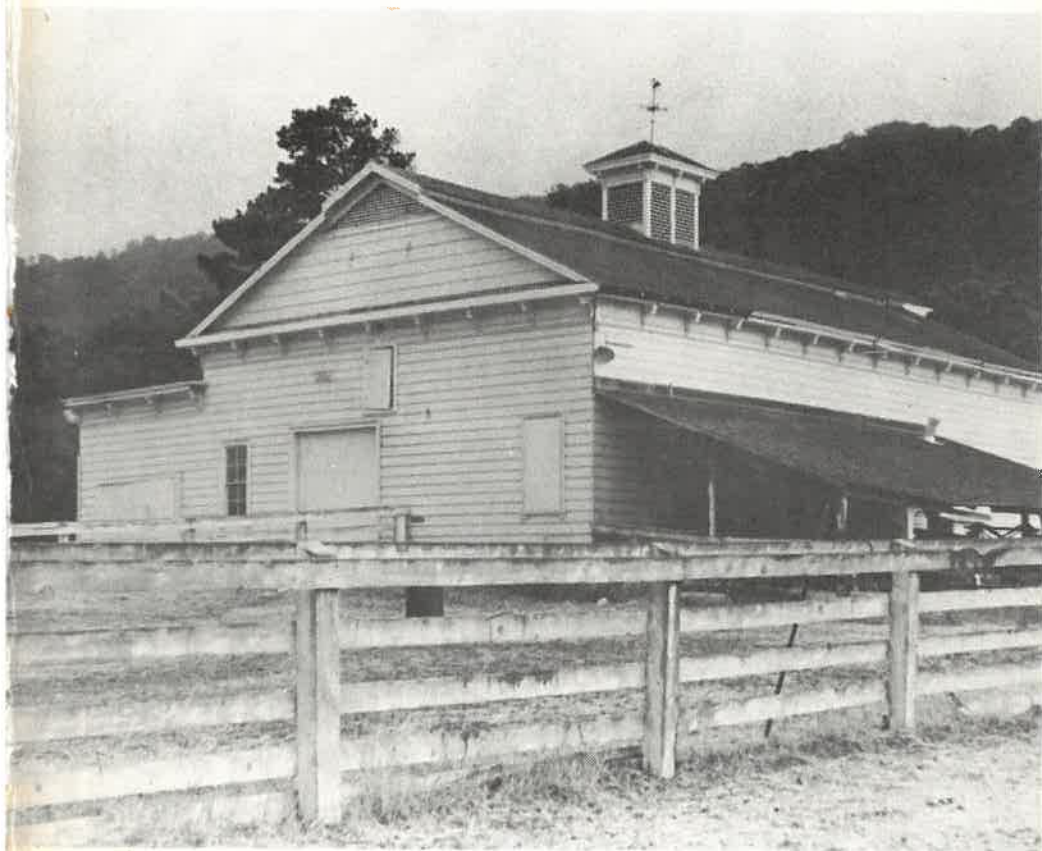

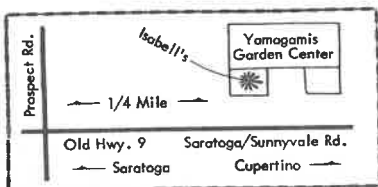

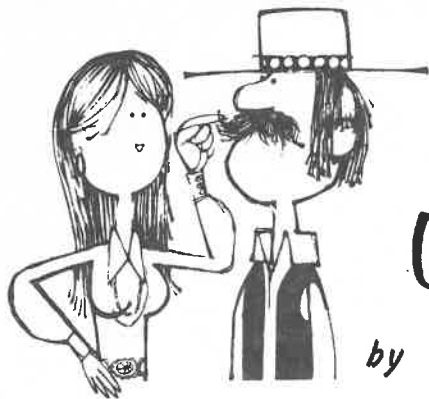

"OUR" OPINION !

If you haven't been reading Club Chatter lately, you're missing out on some interesting reading. Be sure to catch the news from the Cow Country Clompers this month.

You may have heard of the "Superman" method of rating a person's ability: Leaps tall buildings with a single bound = Outstanding; Climbs tall buildings = Very Good; Can find tall buildings = Average; Walks into walls = Needs improvement. A caller we know uses a similar system with his class, from "Always uses left arm for Left Allemande" down to "Can't tell left from right". It's a fact of life that new dancers will vary in learning ability. Occasionally there may be some who aren't able to keep up with the rest of the class. Every club and caller must be prepared to deal with this possibility.

There are many possible causes, and solutions, for this problem. One of the most important things a club (and/or caller) can do is to ensure

that class members know -- in advance -- the conditions for successful completion of the class and/or membership in the sponsoring club.

Poor attendance is a major cause of deteriorating skills among class members -- they simply fall behind the rest of the class. While anyone may have to miss a class night on occasion, the importance of regular attendance should be emphasized to your class.

Others in your class may fall behind because they learn more slowly. If the majority of your class is having problems, then the problem may not be with the class. It's possible that your caller is pushing the class too rapidly, or not giving the class enough review.

It's important at this point to note that someone who has fallen behind may be able to catch up. After careful evaluation by the club and caller, it may be appropriate to

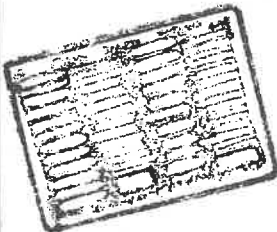

Was That Really



MAINSTREAM??

by Jay Klassen

VEER FAMILY
CALLERLAB Basic #44

Definition:

(CALLERLAB #44) Starting formation: Facing couples, facing dancers, mini-wave, two-faced lines.

(a) Left (b) Right - Two facing couples, working as a unit, or dancers move (to the left or right as directed and forward) to end in a two-faced line or a mini-wave respectively. From a mini-wave or a two-faced line, the veering direction must be toward the center of the mini-wave or line. Each dancer or couple, working as a unit, moves forward and inward to end back to back with the other dancer or couple respectively.

(Callers NOTE: The definition above replaces Burleson #107.)

Observations:

Although the dancers seem to understand the movement(s) required for the Veer Family, they frequently do not execute these commands well due to their infrequent exposure to any formations except 'facing couples Veer Left' and 'right-facing two-faced lines Veer Right'. Regarding all the other formations (and possible Veer commands), the dancers either hesitate or 'freeze' due to: 1) Callers not teaching or calling these calls; 2) Callers not being creative enough to use some smooth-flowing combinations of the

calls; and 3) Callers not exploring the versatility of the calls. With respect to the "individual dancer" Veer actions allowed by the new definition above, many dancers will require some 'retraining' and appropriate workshoping in order to achieve some success with these calls when used in this manner. It is interesting to note that many new or original formations can be achieved using the "individual Veer" calls.

Teaching Tips:

Dancers seem to have very little difficulty with the "couples Veer" calls immediately following the definition as long as two points are stressed: 1) Each couple must move forward as a unit in the direction indicated; and 2) The ending formation will always be either a two-faced line or 'couples back-to-back'. My own personal preference is to stress both "couples Veer Left" and "couples Veer Right" during the initial instruction period; and to very carefully avoid using the Veer calls at all times following a Star Thru. Regarding the "individual Veer" actions, my preference is to delay instruction of these calls until after completion of the Mainstream Program — and then re-teach the Veer calls for both the individual and couple formations. Even though this practice requires separate teaching sessions, the benefit seems to be more positive dancer understanding of these calls when they are in individual or unusual formations. My experience has shown the Z formation to be the most effective for initial instruction of the "individual Veer" calls. In all cases, it is recommended that: 1) Veer calls never immediately follow a Star Thru; and 2) Veer calls be frequently used.

TEACHING (Initially)

Head couples Veer Left, Veer Right, California Twirl, Veer Left, Veer Right, California Twirl (at home).

Too many dancers go to Advanced workshops and get blown away on the Mainstream and Plus calls that are less frequently used.

Next, we rate dedication to learning and dancing Advanced and Challenge very high. Too many times we talk to dancers who say they want to get into the higher levels, but really don't have the time to devote to it. We suggest they take up bowling or something else instead. It's not that easy to learn unless you are willing to put in some time and effort and then go out an dance it.

Brains, or the willingness to use them, are also necessary in order to become a good Advanced or Challenge dancer. We don't mean you have to be a super brain to do it, but you must be able to learn and do commands by definition more than by position (due to the many positions and formations used at the higher levels). A review of the article by Ruth Bothne in the June Prompter would be of great value on this point.

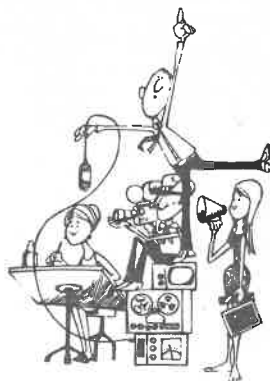
We have said that the really top Advanced and Challenge dancers that we meet have the technical knowledge to become callers with very little effort if they wished to. This is because they have spent a great deal of time learning the definitions of calls and the concepts and formations of square dancing. Being willing to admit that a least some callers do not walk on water, we only need to call on one of the

FLASH!! Hot off the sewing machine! A new slip by Malco Modes, and we're really excited about it! It's a bouffant, four tiered, double layer, organza with the prettiest lace on the bottom tiers — it's a forty yard slip, BUT each tier is reinforced with invisible leader line, resulting in a fuller slip with less yardage that resists crushing even under heavier fabrics. Be sure to take a look at it, we bet it'll be love at first sight.

Did you visit the Dance Store's Summer Affair? If not, you missed the new "Super Slimming Belt Kits". They contain enough supplies for one waistband: belting, the hard to find wide elastic, and a heavy duty hook and eye as well as step by step instructions. Also for the dancer who sews, another new C & C pattern (#107) that features a skirt of lace trimmed petal shape gores, a wide waistband and loose fitting sleeves that are gathered toward the shoulder seam with lace trim. (I think I'd like to try a petal sleeve with this to carry out the skirt theme.)

Have you seen the gold metallic chrome, oval stickers made for round dancers, square dancers and cloggers? Also, now available for cloggers — antenna flags!

Fresno's Dick Waibel has entered the record producing business with his "Rawhide" label. His first two offerings have good music and a strong bass beat. "Mountain of Love" (103) is by Dick, and "Lonely Heart in Town" (102) is by Doug Saunders from San Francisco. ESP is putting out consistently good records and has done two especially good ones this month — both fast moving. "Ease the Fever" (501) by Bob Newman, and Elmer Sheffield's

"Rolling in My Sweet Baby's Arms" (109), which is not only fast moving but also has a good strong, floor raising key change.

There are two more Petticoat Patter records for the lady callers, "Someday Soon" (103) by Toots Richardson, and "You Are My Sunshine" (102) by Sharon Short... and by the way, it's not just the female caller buying this label. Gary Shoemaker has another Chaparral hit, "That Song is Driving Me Crazy" (312). And here is an especially good record for those newer (and maybe other) callers that are working on their phrasing... Gold Star's hoedown called "Phrasing on Beat" (404). It is arranged into very definite, easily recognizable 16 beat phrases.

For you dancers who are always looking for good workshop records, Square Tunes has produced three more. This time they feature Peel the Top (603), Coordinate and Triple Trade (604), and Trade the Wave and Turn and Left Thru (605)... more ways to get extra practice.

This month's batch of new releases has more really good records than usual... well worth your time to visit your record store and listen to them all!

Last month we promised more information on the subject of the selection of the Round of the Month. Due to the summer months and the scheduling of teachers' and callers' meetings, there has not been sufficient time for the two Associations to get together. Once again, we promise to keep you posted as information becomes available.

Continuing with our basic rhythms, this month will feature the waltz.

WALTZ RHYTHM STEPS

STANDARD WALTZ - Three foot movements to a three beat musical measure done by two steps and closing on the third step.

AWAY AND TOGETHER - Movement away from partner then back toward partner with progression in a given direction.

BALANCE (WALTZ) - Same action as in two step rhythm but in waltz time.

BANJO WING TO SIDECAR - Man forward right, draw left to right, touch left; (Woman back left, side right across Man, forward left to Sidecar;)

FORWARD WALTZ - See Standard Waltz.

LEFT FACE TURNING WALTZ - Starting in Closed Position step on free foot (forward on left or back on right) turning 1/4 left face, continue to turn left face on next foot continuing progression started on first step, close free foot to supporting foot having completed a 1/2 turn;

RIGHT TURNING WALTZ - Starting in Closed Position step on free foot (back on left or forward on right) turning 1/4 right face, continue to turn right face on next foot continuing progression started on first step, close free foot to supporting foot having completed a 1/2 turn;

SOLO WALTZ TURN - Man forward turning away from partner, continue turn side, close to complete 1/2 turn; back continuing turn, side, close to indicated position;

TWINKLE - A figure in which partners cross free foot past the other on the first count. Instructions will indicate which partners cross in front and which cross in back as they change to Sidecar, Banjo or other position. (Cross, sd, cl;)

THRU TWINKLE - Same as Twinkle except both partners cross in front.

PROGRESSIVE TWINKLE - Same as Twinkle but partners progress in direction indicated.

THRU SIDE CLOSE - Both partners bring foot between each other taking weight, step side, close;

TURN FACE CLOSE - Step in established direction taking weight and beginning to turn, step side to face partner, close;

BOX (WALTZ) - Forward on Man's left foot, step side on right foot, close left foot to right foot; back on right foot, step side on left foot, close right foot to left foot;

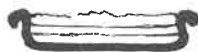
Appetizer:

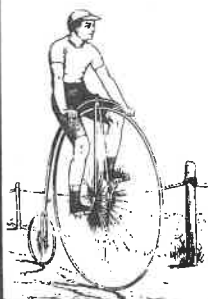
Salad: "OH-H, THAT SALAD!"

CIRCULATIN' WITH THE



Many people have the concept that a square dance is very similar to a "barn dance" complete with hay bales, fiddlers, and a "hootin' and hollerin' good time". Those of us who dance at the local elementary school or in a city parks and recreation building know that the weekly meeting of the "Twirlers" square dance club has little resemblance to the barn dance of 100 years ago. There is a club in our area though which has been able to combine the best of both of these concepts into a active modern square dance group.

The Square Circles of Pleasanton was started in the Livermore area in the 1940's. The club grew out of a USO group directed by Tom Greer. After the war the club disbanded for awhile, but was reorganized in 1949 with Tom Greer as the volunteer caller. The group adopted the name Square Circles and hired John Jellinghausen as their first professional caller.

At the beginning of 1960, Walter Johnson, who was a member of the club, offered the club the use of the barn on his Golden Eagle Ranch in Pleasanton as their permanent

dancing site. When members first viewed the barn they saw a building over 100 years old which had been in continual use for the housing of animals. There were stalls, a dirt floor, a hay loft, and many parts of old farm equipment as might be collected over a 100 year span of time. Undaunted, the club members dug in, and with donated time and materials, they remodeled the inside of the whole facility. They installed new floors, added needed bathrooms, put in electrical wiring, fans and a fresh coat of paint.

The first hoedown was held in the "new" barn in March of 1960. The caller was Jim Knudsen who was celebrating his seventh year as club caller. Walter Johnson passed away a few years ago, but as part of his legacy to the club, his estate allows the club the use of the barn for all their activities. The only proviso is that the club cannot change the exterior of the building. Because the barn still has the original, 130 year old, slate roof, there are one or two leaks during the rainy season.

The barn's primary dancing area is the hayloft, which will accommodate about 25 squares. At one end of the hayloft are large doors which can be opened in warm weather to give a beautiful view of the hills and to allow cooling breezes in. The lower floor contains the refreshment area and is used for overflow dancing when the club sponsors a hoedown.

Jim Knudsen was followed as caller by Walt Tremain who served

the group until 1966. The club auditioned several different individuals for the caller's position before finally selecting John Frerichmann and his wife Jean in November of 1966. John was with the group for 17 years before retiring in May of this year and moving to Jackson, California. The new club caller is Terry Mosier.

The club has many outside activities such as picnics, mystery trips, barbecues, swim parties, bowling and golf tournaments, and good hoedowns (with even better afterparties). They are actively involved in a project to replace the "old" red barn in San Ramon with a "new" red barn (that's a different barn and a different story) to be used for dancing and other activities. They are sponsoring a benefit hoedown on September 18th and John Frerichmann will be returning to do the calling with live music by the Ghostriders. The proceeds will go to the Red Barn Association. They also sponsor a beginners' class each year which keeps the club supplied with new dancers.

The current club Presidents, Sue and Gordon Lund, have recently taken over from past Presidents, Bruce and Sandy Murray. The group dances every Thursday evening at the Golden Eagle Ranch in Pleasanton. If you've never danced in a "real" barn, then you've got a treat in store. You're welcome to join them, but you'll have to leave your "spurs" at home.

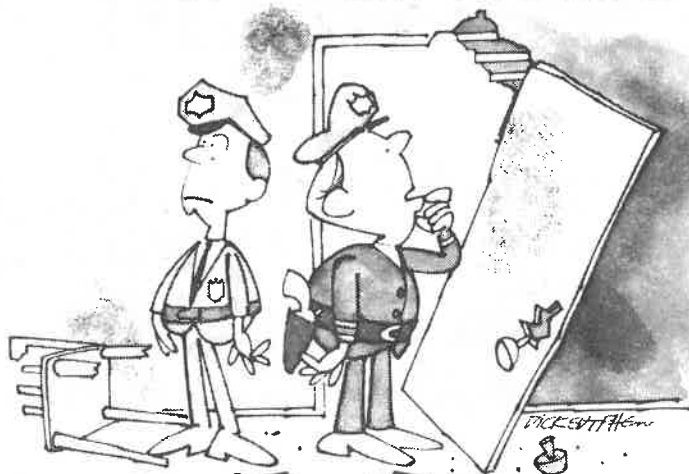

There has been much discussion of late regarding the inability of clubs to maintain the interest of newer dancers after graduation and, in fact, the older dedicated club members as well. A number of reasons have been offered; everything from "the absence of Mainstream level clubs" to "just plain tired of dancing to the same caller". 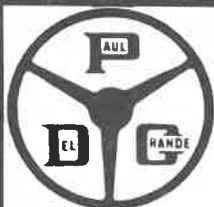
For any organization that is centered around a recreational activity to flourish, the members must go a little further by involving themselves in one or more, ill or well defined cliques. Unless we are to become career students of the dance (that is, advancing up through the levels of Challenge) then our interest must be maintained by a primary association with one or more friends within the activity.

If we carry out our responsibilities and extend the proper courtesies to all members of the group then we need not feel guilty of having special or favorite friends. If we recruited our beginners on the buddy system or from our existing circle of friends, we would lower our attrition rates, expand the aforementioned sub-cultures, and subsequently fill our halls. After awhile, square dancing for most of us becomes an activity that friends get together to do, not a skill that we simply want to maintain.

If we analyze our attendance records, we will find that the cliques attend in whole, or in part, nearly every club function. And who knows, perhaps the rest come down just to see what the darn fools will do next?

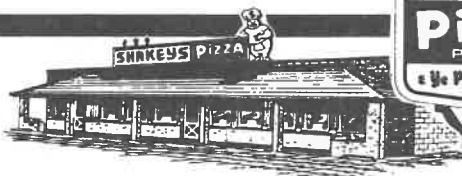

We are entering the summer season and, in many areas, dancing activities will be curtailed. Classes throughout the country have had their graduation exercises. Now the real challenge is before us. We have introduced many new dancers to the wonderful world of square dancing, and we assume that most of them are interested in continuing their new-found hobby. Now let's encourage them so that their enthusiasm doesn't diminish during the summer months. In areas where clubs take a break from dancing during the summer, maintaining the enthusiasm of new dancers may pose a bit of a problem. However, your new dancers can be included in many activities which may or may not involve dancing.

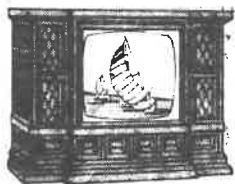
Summertime is a good time to nurture the seeds of those friendships planted during the busy fall and spring classes. Now is the time to make them grow. How about a patio party or a pool party with lots of good food and time to relax and get to know one another? Or a barbecue? Or a picnic? Perhaps the patio or a cleaned out garage (a bonus, incidentally) will provide space for a bit of practice and relaxed dancing. One need not invite the entire group at one time, but might consider smaller groups of people with similar backgrounds, abilities, etc. And, of course, square

dancers seem to make their best recipes when invited to lend a hand to provide food.

Camping trips also offer a great opportunity for including the new dancers in a relaxed, fun atmosphere where they can get to know club members and each other. If you are going to an out-of-town dance or a nearby festival, you may want to invite some of the new dancers to go along. They might be hesitant to go on their own, but would jump at the chance to go with someone friendly who could help and encourage them.

Although there will be many workshops available to the newly graduated dancers, do not push them into an experience which might be discouraging and frustrating to them. Instead, encourage them to experience the fun of dancing at the level at which they graduated and to develop expertise at the level for a year or more before they move on to new programs. You will make a welcome contribution to reducing the drop-out rate if you do this.

Please remember to provide that personal touch for the newly graduated dancers during the summer months and encourage them to appear on the club doorstep with dues in hand when the fall dance season starts.

recommend that anyone having problems join a second class to benefit from additional hours of practice each week. Attending newer dancer hoedowns can also help to build dancing ability. Some clubs hold a pre-class review session each week which consists of walkthroughs for those who missed the previous week's session or who would like additional practice. We have found this to be very successful (and popular) with one of our own classes.

We note that the Gadabouts (see Club Chatter) are planning to try something new with their next class. They will have a full square of club dancers at class each week to demonstrate the moves being taught. We think this is a great idea.

Be sensitive to the fact that some dancers may have a hearing problem. While you cannot solve this problem for any dancer, point out to the class that the sound may vary throughout a hall. Suggest that those who are having difficulties hearing the caller always square up where the sound is best.

For a very small minority, none of these solutions will work. If you find you have class members who simply can't keep up, recommend that they re-start with a class that began after yours (i.e., if you have a class that started in September, provide them with information on classes that started in January). This will allow them another chance to learn and review troublesome moves, and while your club may not enjoy the benefit of their

membership, they won't be lost to square dancing!

If you are going to ask someone to leave your class, it is important to make this decision as early as possible. We believe that everyone who graduates from a club-sponsored beginners class should be eligible for membership in that club. If this is not the case with your club, the requirements for membership should be clearly explained to your class when it starts. Don't wait until after they graduate!!

The key to successful club/class/caller relations is COMMUNICATIONS. Let people know what is expected of them, and where they stand. With rare exception there is a place for everyone in square dancing!

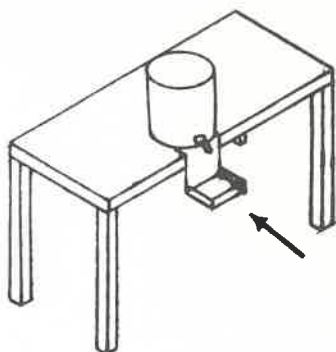
