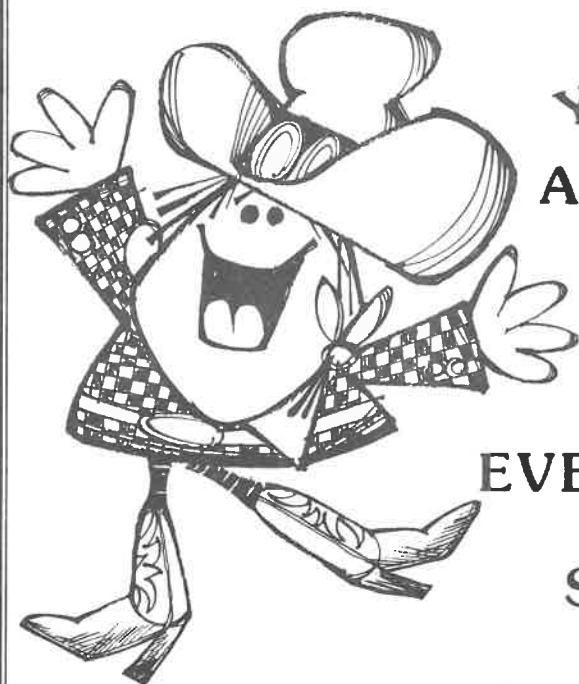

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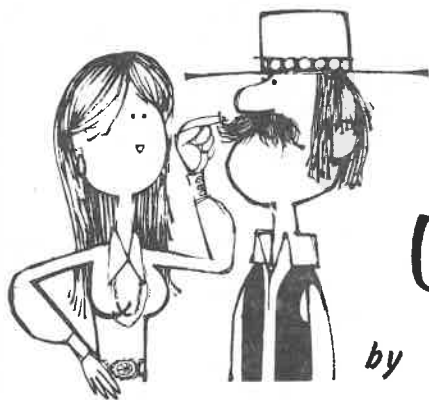
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"OUR" OPINION !

May ended as it had started — on the road. We had spent the first weekend of the month at Reno for Silver State and the Annual Prompter Fun Trip. On Memorial Day weekend we left for a week of calling at Marv Lindner's Kings Valley resort in Crescent City, California.

On the way we stopped in Grants Pass, Oregon to visit with our friends Jerry and Danette Bradley. Jerry, a caller who was raised in the Santa Clara Valley, now lives in Medford, Oregon where he owns a meatpacking business. Jerry calls a full "home" program in Medford and Grants Pass as well as traveling extensively. He also records for, and produces, "El Dorado" records.

(Believe it or not, the fastest way from San Jose to Crescent City is through Grants Pass. Just ask anyone who's driven Highway 299 from I-5 to 101.)

We had arranged to meet Jerry and Danette in Grants Pass for dinner, a visit to the Annual

Boatnik Festival, and an update on square dancing in Southern Oregon. As an unexpected bonus we heard an interesting story of cooperation between square dancers and the community to build a hall for dancing in Grants Pass.

The Boatnik Festival has been a Memorial Day weekend tradition in Grants Pass for over 25 years. For most of the residents and visitors, the highlights are the parade and the white-water boat races on the Rogue River. (According to an editorial in the local newspaper the name Boatnik was probably the result of a 1957 Disney movie called "The Boatniks".) For Oregon dancers the highlight is the three day Boatnik Square and Round Dance Festival, now in its 16th year.

The dance was held at the Fairgrounds in Grants Pass in a hall that belongs to the square dancers for 50 weeks each year. Several years ago, as square dancing increased in popularity, the clubs

Both square and round dance classes will be in abundance so, if you are doing one without the other, look the ads over carefully — you're bound to find "one of the others" that is convenient for you.

Many volumes have already been written and published about how these two dance forms compliment one another, so we will skip any additional verbiage for now. You will be the only true loser if you don't partake of both. Plans for the Fall should be made now, not when Fall arrives. I can just hear the old cliché, "If I had only known, I would have arranged things differently." 'Nuff said!

INTERNATIONAL ROUND DANCE STANDARD

Phase II of Round Dancing

TWO STEP RHYTHM

BACK-TO-BACK - See Face-to-Face and Back-to-Back.

FACE-TO-FACE - See Face-to-Face and Back-to-Back.

FACE-TO-FACE AND BACK-TO-BACK - A two measure figure, side left, close right to left, side left turning away from partner (Man left face and Woman right face) to a back-to-back position, hold; side right, close left to right, side right turning toward partner (Man right face, Woman left face) to designated position, hold;

HITCH - A step in direction of movement, followed by a close step, followed by a step in opposite direction, followed by a hold;

PROGRESSIVE SCISSORS - Same as Scissors but partners progress in direction indicated.

SCISSORS - A figure in which partners cross free foot past the other on the third count. Instructions will indicate which partners cross in front and which cross in back as they change to Sidecar, Banjo or other position.

THRU SCISSORS - Same as Scissors except both partners cross in front.

TWO TURNING TWO STEPS - A right face figure consisting of six steps and generally using two measures of music. In Closed Position using a blending action step side left, close right to left, side and diagonally across line of progression left and pivoting 1/2 right face on left, hold; step side right, close left to right, side right pivoting 1/2 right face on right, hold; (sd,cl,trn,-; sd,cl,trn,-;). (Woman) Step side right, close left to right, side right pivoting 1/2 right face on right, hold; step side left, close right to left, side and diagonally across left and pivoting 1/2 right face on left, hold; Ending position and facing direction may change with choreography — i.e., SCP, SCAR, etc.

Definition:

(CALLERLAB April 1983) Starting formation: Parallel four-dancer columns. #1 and #2 dancers in each column single file promenade two positions (in the direction of the original joined hands); while #3 and #4 dancers in each column single file circulate one position and then do the 'Anything' call.

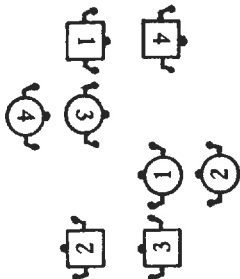
Possible Anything moves include: Trade, Scootback, Single Hinge, Partner Tag, U Turn Back, Cast Off 3/4, Box Circulate, Walk & Dodge, and Follow Your Neighbor.

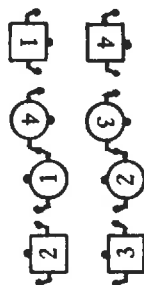

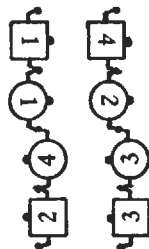
#1 and #2 dancers in each column single file promenade two positions (in the direction of the original joined hands); while...

do the 'Anything' call (e.g., Trade).



DANCING HINTS

The lead (#1) dancer should always promenade slightly 'wide' to establish the "tracking path" for the #2 dancer in the column and to allow the trailing dancers (#3 and #4) enough 'real estate' in the center of the formation to properly execute the 'Anything' call. The action for the #1 dancer is similar to a Cross Peel Off and Circulate one position, or to the Men's part (standard positioning) of a Track II.

All dancers in the starting column should check their position. If there will be a second dancer

coming at you in the other column, then you will be active with that dancer in executing the 'Anything' call. If there is not a second dancer facing you in the other column, you will be a 'tracker'.

As a #3 or #4 dancer in the column you should establish definite eye contact with the dancer that you will be active with and join a hand with that person (establishing a momentary box formation) before you start to execute the 'Anything' call.

Upon completion of the call, do not "wander" or "drift" forward. The possibilities for the 'Anything' part of this call allow many unusual or infrequently used formations to be established. Hold your position and let the caller worry about what is to be called next.

Observations for Callers:

Track & Anything is the only current Plus Quarterly Selection and

is usually executed well by the dancers as long as the 'Anything' call involves the use of 'the joined hand' for the #3 and #4 dancers. In those situations where there is an 'antiseptic' call used for the 'Anything' portion (e.g., U Turn Back, Walk & Dodge, Box Circulate, Partner Tag, etc.), there seems to be a natural tendency for the formations to be 'ragged' (or downright sloppy) due to the trailers not clearly establishing with whom they are to be active before they attempt to execute the 'Anything' portion of the call. Once again, almost any use of this call from left-hand columns can be expected to 'destroy the floor' unless some very intensive "workshopping" is accomplished. Track & Anything is an extremely versatile call that can be used to establish many infrequently used formations (3x1 lines and some unusual T-bone formations).



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Stir The Bucket With Betty

Barbecue is the summer pastime -- but doesn't have to be the doldrums when it comes to food. Below are some of our summer favorites.

MINI RIBS

Use 1/4 to 1/2 lb. per person of regular ribs cut into 1 1/2 to 2 inch lengths. Rub with salt and pepper to taste and set over grey coals to begin browning. Turn frequently, browning evenly. Once browned brush on favorite barbecue sauce or spicy glaze and continue to cook until crispy. Try the Mustard Glaze below.

MUSTARD GLAZE

1/2 cup Dijon mustard
1 tsp. dry mustard
1/3 cup cider vinegar
1/3 cup packed brown sugar
1/2 cup honey
1 Tbsp. dark sesame oil
1 Tbsp. soy sauce

Whisk together mustards in small saucepan. Whisk in remaining ingredients. Simmer for 5 minutes. Stir. Let cool before using. This



sauce can be refrigerated up to 3 weeks. Makes 1 cup.

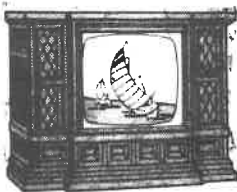

LEMON MARINATE CHUCK ROAST

1 4lb. 1 1/2" thick chuck roast
1 tsp. grated lemon peel
1/2 cup oil
2 Tbsp. sliced green onion tops
4 tsp. sugar
1 1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. Worcestershire Sauce
1 tsp. prepared mustard
1/8 tsp. pepper

To marinate: Score fat edges of roast. Combine above ingredients and pour over roast. Cover and let stand 3 hours, or overnight, turning several times.

To barbecue: Heat coals until



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grey. Pat roast dry after removing from marinate. Reserve marinate. Grill roast, basting occasionally with marinate. Heat marinate on grill in small container. Cut roast across grain and serve with marinate spooned over slices.

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VEGETABLE KABOBS

mushrooms - rinse in hot water
zucchini - bias cut into cubes
onion - cut into quarters
cherry tomatoes
pattipan squash - cut into cubes
3 Tbsp. Italian dressing
2 Tbsp. lemon juice
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

Make a marinate by mixing together the dressing, juice and Worcestershire sauce. Brush marinate on vegetables and heat them over coals until tender and lightly grilled, but not soft.

KEY LIME PIE

1 Tbsp. gelatin 1 cup sugar 1/4 tsp. salt 4 egg yolks 1/2 cup lime juice 1/2 pt. whipped heavy cream 1/4 cup water 1 tsp. grated lime peel green food coloring 4 egg whites 1 9" pastry shell, baked

Mix gelatin, 1/2 cup sugar and salt in saucepan. Beat together egg yolks, lime juice and water; stir in gelatin mixture. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to boiling. Remove from heat and add grated lime peel. Add food coloring until light green in color. Chill. Stir occasionally until mixture begins to mound when dropped from spoon. Beat egg whites until soft peaks form. Gradually add in 1/2 cup sugar to form stiff peaks. Fold chilled gelatin mixture into egg whites. Fold in 1 cup whipped cream. Pile into cooled pastry shell. Chill until firm. Spread remaining whipped cream on top and garnish with nuts, lime slices and/or grated lime peel.

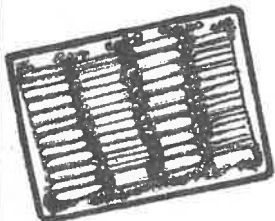

FOLDED-STAR SHIRT

The renaissance of folk arts and crafts has affected most areas of life in recent years. In sewing circles this folk art interest was most widely evident in quilting. We'd like to share with you a simple, but very impressive, quilting technique — the folded star.

The folded star is an interesting and versatile adaptation of the pieced and quilted stars used by quilters of long ago and still used by quilters today.

After making several stars for wall hangings, it occurred to me that maybe they could be used on a square dance skirt or on the yokes of a western shirt. This led to the creation of a new shirt for Randy, with two stars on the front yoke and one star centered on the back yoke.

I chose the fabric for the shirt to match a jumper for me. Part of the fabric for the stars matches another dress I have. This way one shirt gives us two coordinating outfits.

Following are directions for making folded stars, and for attaching the three stars to the yoke of a western shirt.

FOLDED STARS

To make each star:

1. Cut five 5" circles for center of star and backing.

2. Cut eight 5" circles of each of the remaining colors desired. For a 5" star only three or four layers (colors) should be used for the best effect.

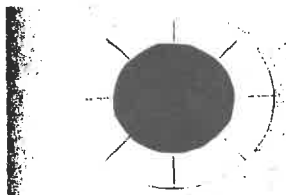


3. Mark the backing circle into eight equal sections with a ruler and pen.

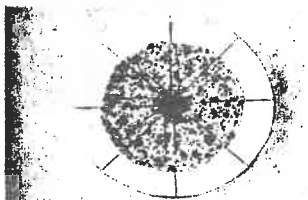
4. Take all of the remaining circles and fold each in half with wrong sides together and press along fold. Fold corners 1 and 2 to the center to make a triangular shape.



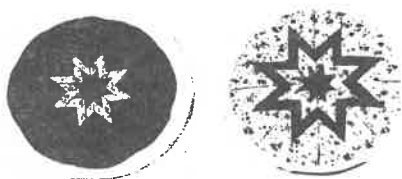
5. Choose four triangles for the center of the star. Place the points of these triangles at the center of the backing circle. Tack the points together, going through the backing. Baste the outer edges in place. When placing the triangles on the backing, I used straight pins to hold them in place.



6. Tack the points of eight triangles, one by one, about $\frac{3}{8}$ " from the center of the backing circle. Line up the center fold of each with one of the lines drawn on the backing circle. Overlap each piece in the same direction. Baste the outer edges in place.



7. Repeat step 6 for two more layers.



8. Sew around the outside edge of the backing circle as close to the edge as possible.

9. Trim the excess fabric from the triangles even with the backing circle.

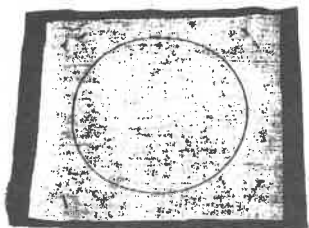
10. Repeat steps 1 - 9 for the other two stars.

MOUNTING THE STARS ON THE SHIRT YOKE

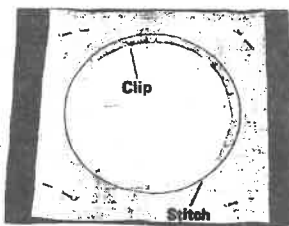
1. Cut two sets of yokes for the shirt.

2. Pair up the yoke pieces, and pin right sides together, so that you have two front yokes and one back yoke.

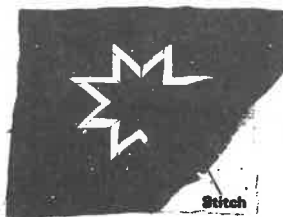
3. Mark a circle, centered on each yoke set, about $4\frac{1}{2}$ " in diameter. Stitch each set of yoke pieces together around the drawn circles.



4. Cut out the center of each circle, leaving a $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowance. Clip around the seam allowance, up to the stitching, about every $\frac{1}{4}$ ".



5. Now turn so the wrong sides are together and press along the seam. Center the folded star behind the opening. Lifting the top yoke piece, baste (between the fabrics) star to the back yoke piece. Stitch (between the fabrics) as close to the previous stitching as possible. No stitching will show on the top.



Finish making the shirt according to directions, using the folded star yokes.

There are many uses for the folded star. More ideas and directions can be found in "Quilting With Folded Stars" by Elaine De Lansey Shinnars. This publication is available at Yardage Fair in San Jose, Quilt Museum in El Paseo de Saratoga, Fun Fabrics in Cambrian Plaza and at La Lace Shop in Willow Glen.

They're made of white poly-cotton eyelet (should be cool) with a 7" fancy eyelet border on the legs that's decorated with little pink rosebuds. These are the cutest, most feminine item we've seen in years!

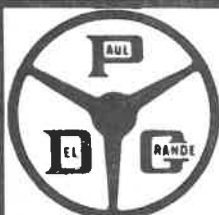
Have you noticed how neat and exact monogrammed items have become? That's because they're now done by computer, and Executive Monograms is doing towels with your name and your club's name on them (with a dancing couple), all done in your club colors. They also have polo shirts in several colors with dancers on the pocket and, if you like, your name or a neat saying above the pocket. These items can be ordered from your local square dance store.

My record pick this month is "Baby Face" on TNT (200), a good old-timer with lots of oomph. There are two new Contras, "Kitatinny Kontra" on Grenn (16015) and "Star and Promenade" on TNT (201).

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Dancing In The Redwoods

During the last week of May, Honey and I had the opportunity to spend five days at Marv Lindner's new Kings Valley Resort, located about 15 miles south of the Oregon border near Crescent City, California. The location Marv is developing has the potential to be a very fine square dance RV resort.

The sign which greets you as you drive north from Crescent City is an example of the small things which can go wrong during the first few months of establishing a new business. As Marv points out, Kings Valley isn't really famous yet — the sign is supposed to say FRIENDLY.

In the RV park itself, things appear to run well. Located in a grove of redwoods, there are about 80 uncrowded RV sites. There are also laundry facilities and a small store, although the store had not been stocked yet. We had looked forward to staying in the park but, because the trailer for visiting callers wasn't ready to be occupied, we stayed in a motel in town.

The schedule of dancing at a resort is enough to satisfy anyone: three square dances/workshops and one round dance workshop every day.



The highlight of Kings Valley Resort is the new square dance hall. The photo above shows the impressive size of the structure. The main dancing area is nearly 7200 square feet, enough room for about 50 squares. The room has stages at both ends and will be divisable into four halls. The building also has an office, refreshment area and space for a square dance shop.

The unusually wet winter this

year delayed the construction of the facility. The hall was scheduled to open on May 20th but, as you can see in the photo below taken on June 1st, it is not quite "dance ready", however, a "pioneer" dance has already been held in the new building. Estimates of a completion date vary widely among the construction team, but all we talked to were working hard to get the hall open as early this summer as possible.



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The campsites at the park are all heavily wooded, as the photo above (right) shows. This RV belongs to Ken and Gee Clark of Santa Cruz who were impressed by the beauty of the area.

Less impressive was the temporary square dance hall, (below) located several miles away in downtown Crescent City. Since people staying at the park have no transportation when their rigs are set up, Marv provides a van to take dancers between the park and the

"House of Motion". The name is left over from the hall's days as a roller rink.

Sharing our week were Sacramento round dance cuers Win and Robbie Robinson, above (left). Win is a very talented teacher and cuer (she managed to teach me "Answer Me"), and both are super people. Robbie is a recently retired Air Force B-52 pilot. We enjoyed discussing the finer points of Minot, North Dakota, where we had both "served time".





The staff of Marv's Kings Valley Resort was certainly friendly. The "Boss", Marv Lindner, shown above (right) with his wife Marlene, has been a successful traveling caller for many years. He stays very busy during the year teaching classes and calling for local clubs, traveling, working with the visiting callers during the summer, and overseeing the construction of his dream, Kings Valley Resort.

Day to day operations are handled by Wilma and Gail (above, left). Gail is the RV park manager



while Wilma takes care of the square dance hall and drives the shuttle van.

Gene and Bill Oakes, below (left), have just moved to Crescent City from Covina (L.A. area). Gene is the resident clogging instructor, and Bill has recently retired and fulfilled his dream of owning a commercial fishing boat.

The resident Round Dance MCs are Hope and John Anderberg, below (right). Hope handles the round dance program on those weeks when no visiting cuer is scheduled.



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Can't Live Without — COFFEE!

Can't wait for that cup of coffee? Think again! You've just arrived at your club and you head for the coffeepot. If you're an early bird and the coffee's ready, someone probably made that coffee at home. I hope that cup of coffee tasted so good that it was worth the risk.

"What risk?" you say. Whoever made that coffee at home was risking his life to bring you that cup!

A car pulls in front of you from nowhere. You're feeling lucky because you didn't hit the car. But just as you think you got off with just a good scare, you're engulfed with liquid. For a second you're mad. After all, you'll have to go home and change. An instant later, you're screaming, "Take it off, take it off!" The steaming hot coffee has soaked through your clothes and is sizzling your skin!

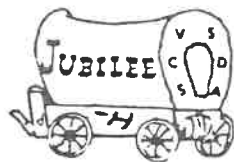

CALLERLAB RULES ON AFFILIATION AND ACCREDITATION EASED

Several years ago, CALLERLAB approved a method of Caller Association Affiliation to encourage closer ties between callers' associations and CALLERLAB. The affiliation does not provide individual membership to CALLERLAB, but does enable affiliated organizations to receive copies of publications issued by CALLERLAB and to keep abreast of CALLERLAB activities.

Associations seeking Affiliate status must make application and pay a fee of \$25.00. The annual renewal fee is \$15.00. Affiliated organizations must also abide by the CALLERLAB Code of Ethics. It is no longer required that the organization have at least one member, who is a CALLERLAB

member, in attendance at the CALLERLAB convention each year.

Bonafide callers' associations may be granted affiliate status whether or not they have a CALLERLAB member and may continue this affiliation for a period of up to three years, at which time at least one of their members must become a member of CALLERLAB and attend the annual CALLERLAB convention. Renewal of affiliate organizations is contingent on at least one CALLERLAB member attending a convention on the same basis as required for full CALLERLAB members; i.e., once in three years for those residing in North America and once in six years for non-North American locations.

Several aspects of caller accreditation also were modified at the 10th Annual CALLERLAB Convention. The period of time for re-accreditation was changed from five to six years. The number of signatures required to revalidate experience was changed from three to one. Procedures also were established to accommodate those callers in isolated or rural areas who have difficulty in meeting accreditation requirements. Each case will be handled on its own merits, and callers who have a problem may request a waiver from the CALLERLAB Accreditation Committee.

Applications from affiliation and requests for waivers on accreditation should be directed to CALLERLAB, Box 679, Pocono Pines, PA 18350.

for the President of The United States, but "perspiration" works better for the President of a square or round dance club.

We're experiencing some renewed problems with mail delivery and the Post Office, particularly in zip codes 94086, 94087, and 94002. All of our mail is now sacked and these zip codes (as well as many others), are sent to San Francisco before distribution to other Post Offices.

I discussed the situation with the director of bulk mail at the San Jose Post Office and he informs me that San Francisco has a new computerized (you might have known) facility for handling bulk mail. This facility still has some bugs to be worked out. He also tells me that all bulk mail deliveries within 150 miles of San Jose should be delivered within four days. (Some people in Belmont have gotten their Prompter up to 20 days late).

He further told me that the delay situation will probably be with us another six months before it smooths out. He reiterated the same "song" that we have said in these pages before. If you don't get your Prompter by the first of the month, please let us know, but more importantly, call the Route Supervisor of the local post office that handles your zip code and complain to him. A local patron complaint goes "miles" further in resolving the issue than complaints from here.

found it increasingly difficult and expensive to find places to hold dances. A group of dancers and callers approached the Fairgrounds management about the use of a building. An unused storage barn was identified, and an agreement was reached: the dancers would donate the materials and labor and the Fairgrounds would rent the completed facility to the clubs for a nominal fee.

The result is impressive — the raised wood floor is comfortable for dancing, the sound is very good, and the hall even has some kitchen

facilities. Everyone has gained: the Fairgrounds now has an additional exhibit hall during the annual County Fair and the dancers have a first-class facility for 50 weeks each year. (The only thing lacking is air-conditioning. The night we visited the hall the weather was very warm. We had thought of Oregon as being cool, but learned that 100+ degree temperatures are common during the summer.)

If you have the opportunity to visit Southern Oregon, plan a stop in Grants Pass. You can look forward to excellent callers and friendly dancers.

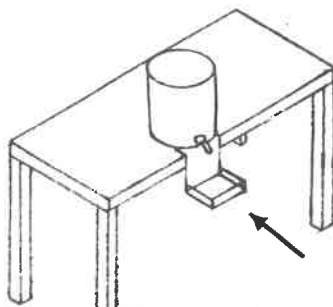
