PUBLISHER'S PATTER

An article in a recent issue of the San Jose Mercury-News addressed the effects of aging on mental abilities, and whether training in old age can improve mental performance.

The article states that researchers have found that, like many other things, mental ability is a case of "use it or lose it". Those people who maintain their mental capacity the longest are similar to those who follow a disciplined program of exercise. It is necessary to keep exercising your brain just like it was a muscle.

The article goes on to say that one of the better ways to keep the mind active is to learn square dancing. (Ah ha, you might have guessed.) "Square dancing brings into play a large number of mental operations. Dancers must listen to keyed instructions - Do Sa Do, Allemande Left - telling them what formations to dance." I knew there was some reason us "old" people dance five nights a week - and you thought I was out there just for the food.

And speaking of old people (which I'm not, you understand), I

have an item of a personal nature. We didn't attend the John Marshall PACE dances last weekend because on Saturday I was participating in a 103 mile bicycle race - and I FINISHED!!! This may not sound like much to some of you, but the big thing was that the average altitude of the ride was around 6000 feet elevation (started in Reno - went up along Lake Tahoe and then up over Mount Rose). Over 600 riders started the race and less than 400 finished, so I feel as though I am still up to dancing every tip at a weekend festival (which we do).

A recent issue of the ZIPCODER, an excellent east coast publication "serving the Advanced level and Challenge community", contained a biography on Lee Kopman. Lee is well known in the square dance community, particularly for his work at the Advanced and Challenge levels. He has authored more than 200 square dance calls, many of which are in constant use today. I don't want to dwell on Lee's many talents, but the article (written by Ms. Janie May) touched on a subject in which I feel we all need

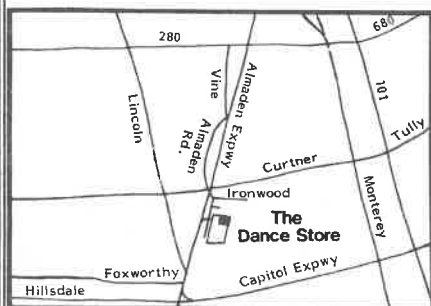

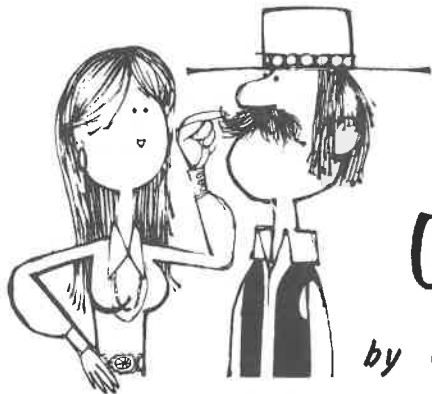

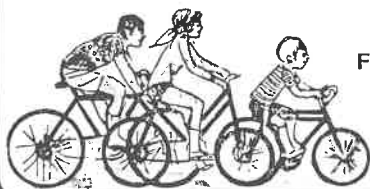

CHALLENGE



★ CORNER

Numerous comments about last month's fable have led us to believe that some got the message, some didn't, and some are still working on it. It was intentionally not made totally clear so everyone could have some fun with it. Possible solutions could be: don't try to go too far too fast; join square dancing and get a divorce; go into Advanced or Challenge dancing and get a divorce; take up bowling and drop square dancing; keep bowling instead of taking up square dancing; or get yourself a rich man.

Recently, a conversation took place at the local callers' meeting regarding the use of the Plus QS figure Track & Anything. It was, according to my sources, decided that it would be okay to use Track & Wheel & Deal if it was indicated to the dancers that everybody was to participate in the Wheel & Deal. Unfortunately, this does not seem to be happening. Many dancers have told us that they believe Track & Wheel & Deal to be an acceptable usage of the call because callers are using it this way. In our opinion, this usage is neither accurate nor acceptable.

According to the CALLERLAB definition, the four trailing dancers in the column are supposed to Single File Circulate one position and then do the & Anything part of the call. Wheel & Deal is not done by only two adjacent dancers. When

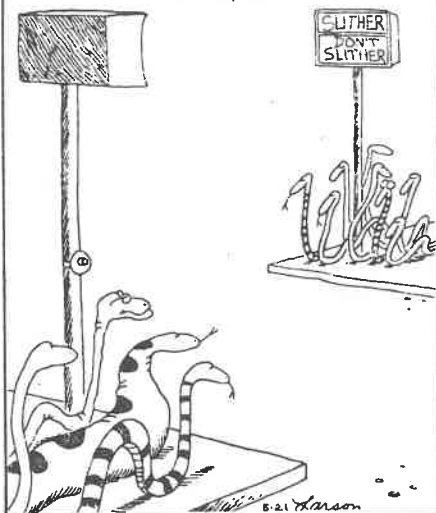
it is, it is called a Single Wheel and is on the Advanced list. How about Track & Single Wheel — then have the centers do a Single Pass & Roll, for example. Anyway, if one expects to have everybody Wheel & Deal, the word EVERYBODY should be used as a sort of cancellation of the & Anything part of the call. We feel, from our experience, that the figure is not getting a very high success rate when it is used and should, and probably will, be dropped anyway.

Speaking of dropping figures, what about some small changes to the Advanced and Challenge lists? There are those who feel that some of the figures on the Advanced list are too hard or are confusing due to other calls on the list which are similar. They also feel that some of the figures on the Challenge list are easy enough in their standard formations for Advanced dancers. For the most part we have found that there is very little rationale for any figure being on any particular list. Most moves just seem to have gotten there for one reason or another; some of which had little or no rational thinking behind them in the first place.

While most of these comments about confusion come from Easy A-2 dancers, it is safe to say that we have many of them out there and

Summertime normally means a change of pace. With that in mind, we would like for you to digest the following article that is reprinted from 'Round Dancer Magazine' (June 1983). This article is excerpted from 'The ABC's of R/D'ing', written by Fred Haury, and is available through Burdick Enterprises, P. O. Box 488, Huron, OH 44839 (and some of our local square dance shops). We can all benefit by paying heed.

FOOT WATCHING

FOOT WATCHING - A no-no!
Foot watching is a most undesirable practice. Foot watching produces poor posture, imbalance, a bad appearance and bounce. The head must be tilted down and forward, and the dancer bends forward at the waist, protruding the fanny and bending the knees. This posture does not present a pleasing appearance.

Foot watching also adds a confusion factor to the dancer's thinking and coordination. A dancer must step with confidence, responding to the music in a timely manner. The dancer does not have time to stop and think through each step or foot action. Each step must be danced in time with the music and forgotten so that the dancer may be ready to respond to the next action. The foot watcher will observe the status of each foot, then watch the step and visually note the new status. Watching

presents an additional communications circuit for the dancer to cope with. The brain must translate the desired action into a mental image. The eye then observes the feet and relays this information to the brain. The brain must then compare the observed action with the desired mental image before the dancer is ready to proceed with the next step. Each step is also more complex because of the typical foot watcher posture, imbalance and bounce.

Dancers must learn to control the free foot as a direct response to the brain. They should step in time with the music, responding to their first thoughts, and should disregard any thought of questions as to right and wrong, or what other possible meanings may be intended. Once the music starts there is not enough time to question, analyze, reason or visually monitor steps. Dancers should step in time with the music, accepting missteps without hesitation so as to be ready to take the next step at the proper time.

Foot watchers do not watch their feet in other daily ambulatory activities. They walk or run forward, back up, cross one foot in front of or behind the other, and turn without visually monitoring

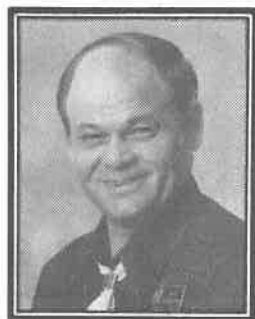

CALLERLAB Plus Call #27

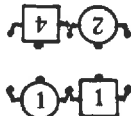
DEFINITION

(CALLERLAB April 1983) Starting formation - Facing couples. Each dancer does a Turn Thru with the dancer he is facing. Each couple then does a Courtesy Turn.

(Callers NOTE: The definition above replaces Burleson #1197.)

TURN & LEFT THRU (Example #1)

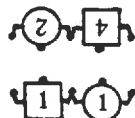
From All Couples Half Sashay, Sides Square Thru...



Each dancer does a Turn Thru with the dancer he is facing.

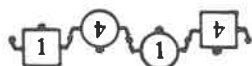


Each couple then does a Courtesy Turn.

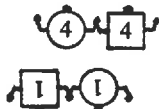


TURN & LEFT THRU (Example #2)

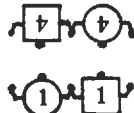
From Sides Lead Right, Touch to a Wave...

DANCING HINTS

The most important part of this call is the Turn Thru (each dancer must be on the exact same spot as when he started, facing the opposite direction). Following the turning action, take an exaggerated step forward to return to the exact 'piece of real estate' where you started the Turn Thru before executing the Courtesy Turn.

Couples may be any combination of men or women. Therefore, the dancer on the left must Courtesy Turn the dancer on the right. Immediately joining hands after the Turn Thru will clearly establish 'who must Courtesy Turn whom' — if you have a 'free left hand', you must Courtesy Turn the right-side dancer.

The Ocean Wave Rule applies to this call (i.e., some calls which normally start from facing couples can be done when dancers are in ocean waves). In these cases, the dancers have already stepped forward toward the facing dancers and are ready to complete the remaining action of the directed call (see Example #2). Establishing

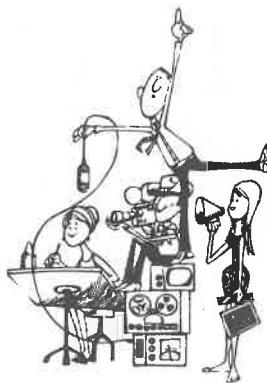

PRODUCT & RECORD REVIEW

From The Dance Store

We've just been to the National and found lots of new things including patterns for Counted Cross-Stitching. There are four different sets, three of them have five to six different sayings for square dancers and the fourth has sayings for round dancers such as "Let's Go Round Together".

And we found some teaching manuals put out by Square Tunes records; written by Ted Frye and critiqued by Jack Lasry. There are manuals for the Basics, Mainstream, Plus, A-1 and A-2 levels, and a deluxe manual that covers them all. Each lesson starts with a list of all previous movements taught, then has the movements to be taught in this lesson -- each with a good definition as well as the starting and ending formations and the timing. Each manual gives a list of, and diagrams for, the formations for that level.

And FOUR new patterns. Two from Authentic: #323, a one-piece dress with with a gored skirt with double ruffle at the bottom, one deep and one small, topped with four rows of rick rack. The bodice is fitted with a scoop neckline, front and back, and elasticized puffed sleeves that form the shoulders. It should be a nice cool dress. #322 has a midriff bodice with an inset of gathered eyelet and the skirt is very different. It's gored and gathered, but in two layers with the upper layer scalloped to show the contrasting fabric of the lower layer -- both layers trimmed with a self fabric ruffle -- very cute. C & C Patterns' two new ones have very unusual skirts: #110 has a V-shaped overlay on the skirt with three tiers of ruffles falling from each side of the V, the bodice has a V-shaped

inset with a ruffle and puffed sleeves. #111 is a midriff with a petal overlay skirt. Lots of skirt interest in these new patterns.

We found sixteen different 45 RPM clogging records by Ralph Pierce, including "Under the Double Eagle", "Boogie Grass Clog", "Disco Duck", and a practice record, also an LP by him, titled "Appalachia" that includes an up tempo waltz, a couple of big circle dances and a very impressive "Mockingbird" that starts slow then breaks into an up tempo clog beat.

Square dance record-wise, we have four new Chaparral releases, "Sunny Side of the Street" (3510) and "Bar Room Buddies" (3511), both by all the Chaparral Boys; a really good "Sunny" (511) by Ken Bower and "Folsom Prison" (313) by Gary Shoemaker. My "Pick-of-the-Month" is "Sweet Georgia Brown" by Joe Porrett on Jo Pat (214). It has a little gimmick in it you'll have to explain. He calls it "Get Down Georgia Brown" -- a Single Circle, Star Thru, Roll to Face -- all of which is repeated and is really a swing step. Hi Hat has produced another of their harmony records in a limited edition... just a few available... it's an oldie, "When By Blue Moon Turns to Gold" (5060-C) by Tom Perry, and be sure to check out "Way to Go Home" (107) by Dick Waibel -- really "Show Me the Way to Go Home"; and "Old Gang of Mine" (109) by Doug Saunders, both on Rawhide. There are many more good releases this month, but I think the editor is going to start editing, so, come in and listen!!

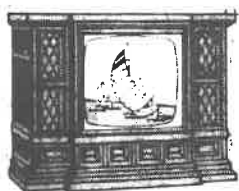

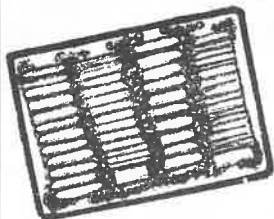

SPECIAL EFFECTS: CROCHETED LACE

Carmen Rios, our spotlighted seamstress this month, dances with the Spinning Wheels of Los Altos. Carmen incorporated crocheted lace panels between skirt panels and as a bodice inset. The effect is a very special one!

Carmen, who normally copies crochet samples, has graciously written down the directions for her crocheted lace. She has used the Heidi bodice, modifying the front panel into a single piece for a neater fit. The bodice panel fits a size 13 and the skirt panels fit a 20" skirt.

CROCHETED TRIM FOR SQUARE DANCE DRESS AND MAN'S SHIRT

MATERIALS

6 balls of Cebelias size 10 - Coton made in France; or 2 (400 yard) balls J. & P. Coats "Knit Cro Sheen". Size 8 steel crochet hook (gauge: each motif measures 2").

MOTIF DIRECTIONS

Ch 6, join with sl st to form ring.

RND 1: ch 3, 4 dc in ring, ch 5, 5 dc in ring, repeat 2 times ending with ch 5 sl st on top of ch 3.

RND 2: ch 3, 4 dc holding last loop on hook, make cluster draw thru all 6 lps on hook, ch 7 repeat cluster, ch 7 make 2 more clusters, after ch 7 join to sl st with sl st.

RND 3: ch 1, 3 sc, on ch, 4 st P, 6 sc on same ch, 3 sc on following ch, ch 7 draw loop thru

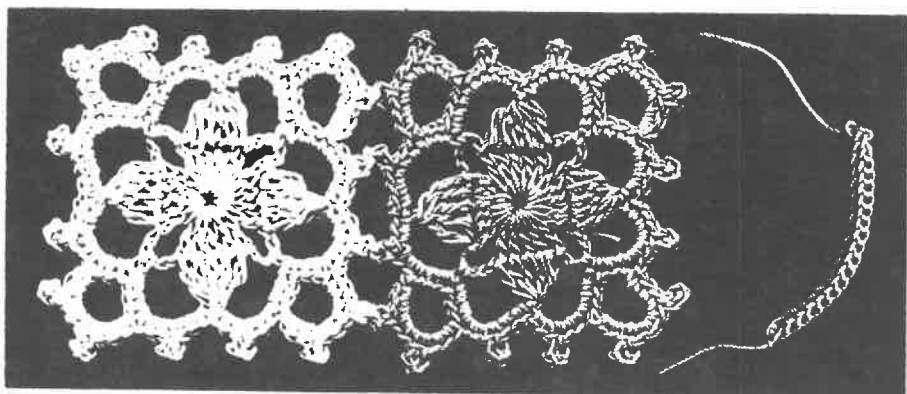


Carmen and Fred Rios model their crocheted lace creations at the 1982 Jubilee Fashion Show.

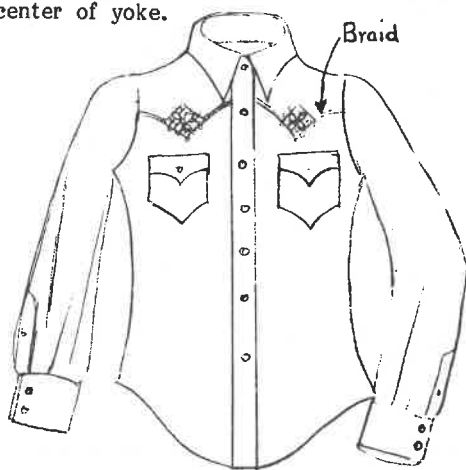
3rd sc from beginning of ch, 3 sc on ch, P, 3 sc P, 3 sc. 3 sc on ch from Rnd 2 P, 3 sc, repeat 2 more times. Join with sl st to ch 1 cut, work cut thread neatly into back of motif.

Second motif is worked the same - join starting on 7th P ch 1 sl st in to P ch 1 close P.

The number of motifs needed depends on the size of the dress being made. For a size 13 it takes 8 strips of 10 each for the skirt, 9 for the panel on the bodice, and 3 to trim the shirt.

CROCHETED BRAID FOR TRIMMING SHIRT

Using size 8 hook: ch 2 pull loop thru ch 1 draw 3rd loop thru two loops on hook; keep working the same until desired length is reached.

 Your POSITION!"

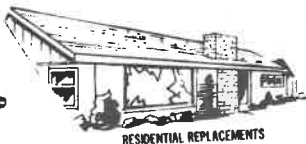
Bless the caller who sees.... many levels of knowing....

PROMPTER PROFILE

Arlan & Donna Wight



During a Longhorns' club night in late 1968, caller Chic Burgess was trying out a new singing call, "Ride, Ride, Ride". When Chic finished the song he expressed his opinion of the record by sailing it, "Frisbee Style", across the room. "Ride, Ride, Ride" came to rest squarely between the feet of new dancer Arlan Wight. Arlan bent over, picked it up, — and a new caller was born.

Arlan and Donna Wight (no "r") had become involved with square dancing a year earlier when they helped form a church-sponsored beginners class. The class folded in early 1968 and Arlan and Donna found the Longhorns and soon became club members.

After picking up (literally) "Ride, Ride, Ride", Arlan asked Chic if he could try doing the record for the club. Chic replied, "Sure, as soon as you memorize the whole record!" As Donna recalls, "It took Arlan three months of practice at home — I was getting sick of the word 'Ride!'"

By the spring of 1969, Arlan was doing a singing call every club

night. "The people in the Longhorns were great. They showed great patience with me, even when I learned to patter and began to do a full tip every week."

Later that year Arlan attended Bill Peters' callers school, and during 1970, "I called tips and one night stands wherever I could — for free." In 1971 he lost his amateur status when he started both a class and a workshop in the Woodside area.

The Rancheros of Redwood City hired Arlan as club caller in 1972 and, by the end of the year, he added a second club, the Merry Mixers, a singles and couples group in San Jose.

An advocate of formal caller training, Arlan attended a 1972 callers' school at Asilomar taught by Lee Helsel, Bruce Johnson and Bob Van Antwerp. Two years later he and Donna traveled to Indiana to attend a Dick Jones class. In 1978 Arlan reversed roles and conducted a new caller training program for the Square Dance Callers

Association of Northern California. He repeated that program in 1979 and 1981.

Arlan currently calls and teaches classes for the Skirts and Flirts (San Jose), the Curli Q's (Palo Alto) and the Krazy Dazys (Cupertino). He also cues rounds at all of his clubs, and he and Donna teach the Square Dance Round of the Month. He has been a member of CALLERLAB since 1975, is a past president of the NorCal Callers Association, and this year was voted one of the Top Ten callers in the Santa Clara Valley.

In addition to their busy square dance schedule, Arlan and Donna maintain a busy work schedule. Arlan, who was born in San Francisco and raised in Woodside and San Mateo, attended the College of San Mateo where he majored in engineering and electronics. After a successful career as a technical sales and manufacturers rep for several Bay Area companies, Arlan started his own company in 1979. ArlanAir specializes in the sales, service and

installation of vacuum pumps and air compressors.

Donna was born in Belleville, Illinois and moved to San Mateo as a child. She met Arlan at San Mateo High (they really were "high school sweethearts"). Donna is a secretary at the Electric Power Research Institute. The Wights have also raised a family, two sons and a daughter.

In his leisure time Arlan enjoys furniture refinishing and running (15 miles a week). Donna enjoys sewing and needlepoint. There is one hobby Arlan has had to give up due to lack of time — skin diving. In fact, it was skin diving that got the Wights into square dancing. Donna would sit on the rocks while Arlan was skin diving, and they decided they needed to find something they could do together. As they reflect on the past 15 years, they agree that square dancing has been just right!

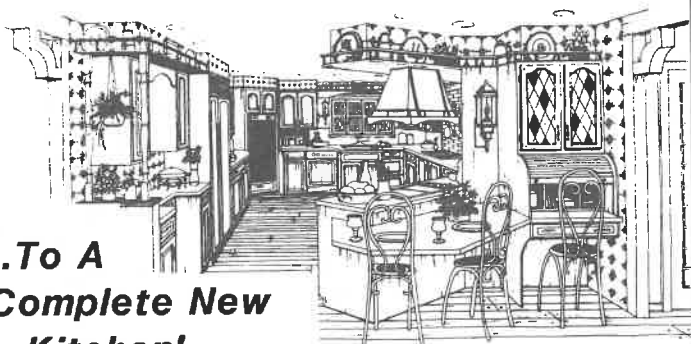

INTERNATIONAL ASSEMBLY OF "TRUSTEES" OF THE SQUARE DANCE ACTIVITY

FIRST REPORT OF THE
1983 LEGACY DANCER SURVEY

The 5,481 forms received in LEGACY's third square dancer survey have been compiled and the results reviewed by its Trustees. All states, Canada and several other nations participated in the survey. Thanks to a computer, a good program and a good operator, the 208,000 data points and 127 pages of comments were reduced to three mini-floppy discs.

Comments were printed in book form for a detailed review by three Trustees who presented their summaries at LEGACY VI in St. Louis last May. It was obvious to all that a great deal of thought, some good ideas and a mountain of love for the activity were evident. Comments ranged from one very succinct sentence to several pages. Everyone who added comments to their survey form can rest assured they have been heard.

The average survey respondent danced between four and five times per month and had about five years experience. The largest group, by frequency, danced four times a month and the largest group, by experience, had been dancing three years. In LEGACY's 1981 survey, the largest group of dancers, by experience, had been dancing two years and the average had been dancing four years. This fact suggests that new dancer retention was less than average between 1981 and 1983.

Dancers were asked, "Of those

you know who've dropped out of square dancing, what do you feel were the most significant reasons for their disappearance from our activity?" The 5,481 respondents checked their forms as follows:

- 38% Felt pressure - towards higher dance levels.
- 28% Felt rushed - inadequate learning time.
- 21% Social - not accepted by any group.
- 13% Caller - inadequate in some way.
- 11% Club - responsibilities or functions.
- 11% Were bored - not enough variety.
- 8% Styling - non-standard or rough moves.
- 34% Other.

A total of 2,195 "other" reasons were given. They broke down into three broad groups : personal (1,250), club related (408), and other dance related reasons, such as "no partners for singles" (82).

About two-thirds of all dancers had been club officers. One-fourth had attended a square dance leadership panel or seminar and two-thirds of those found the information useful.

Respondents were asked what methods of teaching and/or emphasizing etiquette were most effective. Sixty-eight percent voted "caller in class" with "by example" and "experienced dancer in class" each receiving a little less than half as many checks. Dancers apparently deem "written material" ineffective since it was checked on

only 6% of the forms.

Dance "mixers" were appreciated more by the less experienced and less frequent dancers. Higher frequency dancers rated "clothes" more positively. Dancers with 4 to 5 years experience had the lowest opinion of club leadership. The poorest overall attitude was scored by 6 to 7 year dancers.

The attitude portion of the survey was designed to define changes in dancers' values regarding 14 different aspects of the square dancing activity. It has a +5 to -5 scale and has been used in the same format for all three LEGACY dancer surveys. Dancers rated the overall activity +2.4 in the first survey (1980), +2.0 in the second (1981), and +2.1 in the third (1983). Averages for twelve of the fourteen separate aspects followed the same profile or had no significant trend. The two that did not conform were "new acquaintances" and "pleasure of dancing". Dancers have collectively rated these lower in each of the three successive

surveys. "Pleasure of dancing" has always been the top scoring aspect, starting with a +4.5 in the first, +4.4 in the second, and +4.3 in the third. However, the steady decline as scored by more than 10,000 dancers over four years should be a cause for concern by dancers and callers alike.

It is impossible to objectively summarize 127 pages of comments and two hundred thousand data points from dancers with such a wide variety of goals. It would seem, however, that most were saying, "Keep the fun and pleasure in dancing, teach them social as well as dancing skills, and reduce pressures wherever you can."

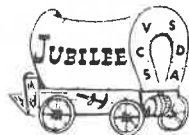

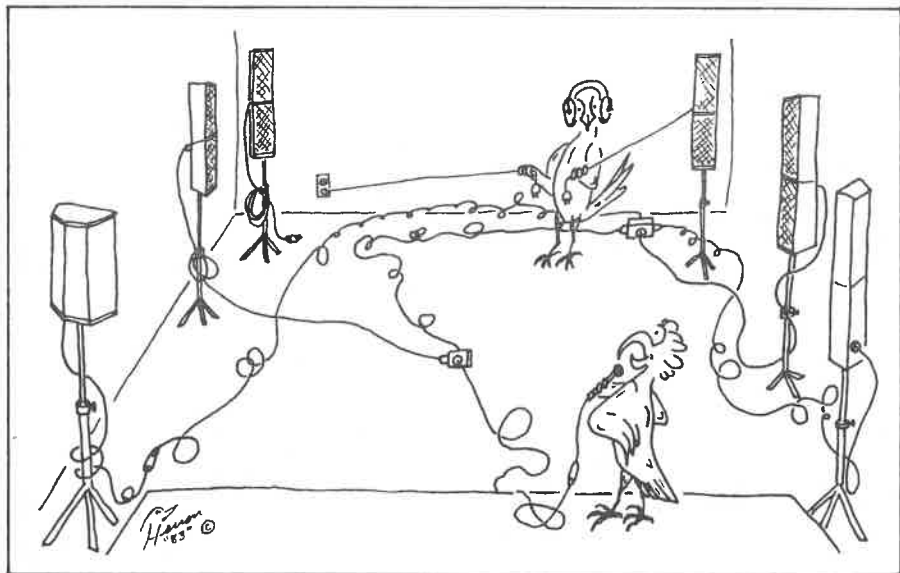
schedule, he and his wife, Shirley, fly from these resorts to other resorts and festivals on the weekends.

more awareness. The following are excerpts. "Despite his interest and advocacy of the Challenge movement, Lee feels that the future of square dancing as a whole lies not in the Challenge sector but at the Mainstream level.... the Mainstream levels have been sorely neglected. Lee feels strongly that the responsibility lies with callers of all levels to serve the Mainstream community. These dancers, after all, undergird all the other levels and must be given serious consideration, for they are truly the future of square dancing. If Beginning and Mainstream dancers are not supported, the numbers at all subsequent levels will eventually go down. That's the bottom line!"

I couldn't agree more with Lee. It's great to see that one of the top callers in the country is concerned about the encouragement and preservation of our favorite sport. (Yes, Lee does have a Mainstream club.) It behooves us all

to promote and encourage square dancing - regardless of the level. Have you ever tried dancing with "phantoms" in your square?? It's much more fun with eight "live" people!

such things. These things are done with natural cadence and confidence. The main difference is that the music controls the cadence in dancing, whereas in other activities people are not concerned with making mistakes as they step.

(Round Dancer Magazine Editor's Note: On another page in the 'ABC's of R/D'ing' Fred explains, "SMOOTH DANCING, as opposed to Bouncy Dancing, is done with the head and shoulders carried along at a steady level without up or down motion as steps are taken." Keep that head up, minimize bounce and sway and you're sure to look your best.)
