MAC'S LITTER BASKET

**A Dancer's
Opinion**

Some of our best friends own motor homes! Naturally one wouldn't invite them over to dinner, or let one's daughter marry their son, but, all in all, they are tolerable. While hardly anyone approves of cliques in square dancing, everyone is in one or more — and motor home owners are perhaps the biggest clique of all. No two motor home owners can possibly converge without the conversation changing to generators and holding tanks, etc., while motel users hardly ever discuss the plumbing.

Not being a motor home owner, this touring reporter has gone to great lengths to make the following report on motor homes vs. motels as unbiased and scientific as possible:

Owning a motor home, like owning a yacht, brings many surprises, not all of them pleasant. Perhaps the initial shock is the price of the first fill-up. Generally speaking, the cost would pay for several carefree nights at a cheap motel, and you wouldn't have to worry if you screwed the cap back on. 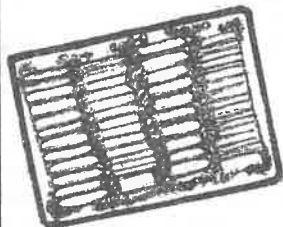
This appraisal of the motor home vs. the motel has been presented in the interest of helping those of you who may be considering the "Big Decision" — to buy, or not to buy!

This month we will finish up with the required basics needed to be a comfortable Easy Level round dancer. Next month we hope to have more input as the busy Fall season approaches.

INTERNATIONAL ROUND DANCE STANDARD Phase II of Round Dancing

WALTZ RHYTHM

BOX (LEFT TURNING) - Forward on Man's left foot turn 1/4 left face, step side on right foot, close left foot to right foot; back on right foot turn 1/4 left face, step side on left foot, close right foot to left foot; forward on left foot turn 1/4 left face, step side on right foot, close left foot to right foot; back on right foot turn 1/4 left face, step side on left foot, close right foot to left foot;

CANTER - Peculiar to Waltz rhythm, allowing only two changes of weight per measure. The first step is taken on count one, hold thru count two, and then close step is taken on count three. It may be done forward, sideward, backward or turning as indicated.

FORWARD WALTZ - See Standard Waltz.

LEFT FACE TURNING WALTZ - Starting in Closed Position step on free foot (forward on left or back on right) turning 1/4 left face, continue to turn left face on next foot continuing progression started on first step, close free foot to supporting foot having completed a 1/2 turn;

PROGRESSIVE TWINKLE - Same as Twinkle, but partners progress in direction indicated.

RIGHT TURNING WALTZ - Starting in Closed Position step on free foot (back on left or forward on right) turning 1/4 right face, continue to turn right face on next foot continuing progression started on first step, close free foot to supporting foot having completed a 1/2 turn;

SOLO WALTZ TURN - Man forward turning away from partner, continue turn side, close to complete 1/2 turn; back continuing turn, side, close to indicated position;

SPIN MANEUVER - A combination of two steps — the Spin and the Maneuver (as defined) where the lady executes a Spin while the man executes a Maneuver.

STANDARD WALTZ - Three foot movements to a three beat musical measure done by two steps and closing on the third step.

THRU SIDE CLOSE - See separate definitions for each word.

THRU TWINKLE - Same as Twinkle except both partners cross in front.

TURN FACE CLOSE - See separate definitions for each word.

TWINKLE - A figure in which partners cross free foot past the other on the first count. Instructions will indicate which partner crosses in front and which crosses in back as they change to Sidecar, Banjo or other position. (cross, sd, cl, -;)

WALTZ AWAY AND TOGETHER - A two measure figure starting in Butterfly or Open Position. Man forward on left turning left face to a Back-to-Back position releasing lead hands and bringing joined trailing hands through, step side on right, close left to right; forward on right turning right face partners bringing joined hands through, step side on left, close right to left ending in Butterfly;

TRADE THE WAVE
CALLERLAB Plus Call #16

DEFINITION

(CALLERLAB April 1983) Starting formation — Any four-dancer ocean wave. Dancers facing the same direction in the wave Trade with each other. Right-hand waves become left-hand waves and vice versa. Ends of the wave become centers and vice versa.

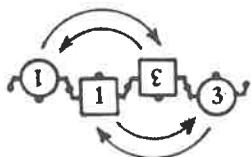

From Heads Pass the Ocean...

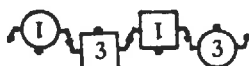


Dancers facing the same direction in the wave Trade with each other.

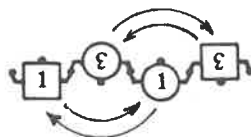


TRADE THE WAVE (Example #2)

Dancers facing the same direction in the wave Trade with each other.



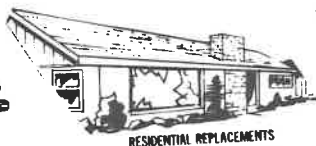
DANCING HINTS

The most important part of this call is for each dancer to know ("see") with whom he is to Trade. For this reason, many callers intentionally try to help by calling "Take a peek and Trade the Wave". You don't have to actually lean forward to establish 'eye contact' with this dancer, but you should definitely establish this contact as soon as possible.

PRODUCT & RECORD REVIEW

From The Dance Store

It's book time! The Sets in Order Plus Booklet is finally out with more than 150 illustrations, good definitions of each basic, and timing and styling for each one as well — that's to help us become smooth dancers as well as proficient ones.



Once again, it's a great bargain at 75 cents each — if you can use 100 at a time, make it 60 cents each, and the 100 can be assorted with the Basic/Mainstream Booklets.

Another book, this time for callers: "Callers Guidebook to Complete Choreography" by H. Orlo Hoadley. There are a few Plus calls in this book, but it primarily explores the Mainstream calls with special emphasis on good smooth choreography. He gives you patterns for each basic that range from easy to some unusual positions that will challenge most dancers in their ability to position themselves accurately and apply the true definition of a basic. One chapter is titled "Trust the Caller" and is intentionally made so unusual that most dancers will be unable "to see their way out of the woods" and only by following the caller's instructions exactly will they get home — all this below the Plus level. Chapter 5 is a collection of 293 unusual figures and 48 breaks to be put into singing calls, all,



once again, stressing smoothness.

Also, for the callers, Sam's Callers' Helpers ... eight little plastic pieces to represent the dancers, designated Man or Lady and with lines on each "person" to indicate how the dancer is paired up, or who he is facing ... now you can really know where each person is when you are working out the new moves.

Malco Modes has come out with some new fall prints for their lower priced skirts — very pretty — and, next month, new clothing and fabrics should be showing up from all the manufacturers.

Callers, you have a lot of good records to choose from this month. Some of my picks are: "Salty Dog Blues" by Larry Letson on ESP (603), "Jose Cuervo" on 4-B (6058) by John Marshall, and all three of the first releases on the new label "Chicago Country". They are "C. C. Water Back" (01), "American Made" (02), and "I Wonder" (03), all by Jack Berg, who is a jazz musician and brings a lot of "know-how" to this new label — looks promising. I missed a record last month that turned out to be a big one — "Highway 40 Blues" on Quadrille (824) by Lee Main — check it out, along with all the good releases this month.





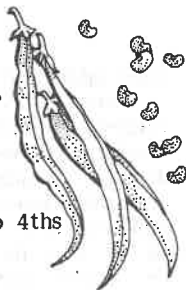
Stir The Bucket With Betty

Appetizer: DILL BEANS

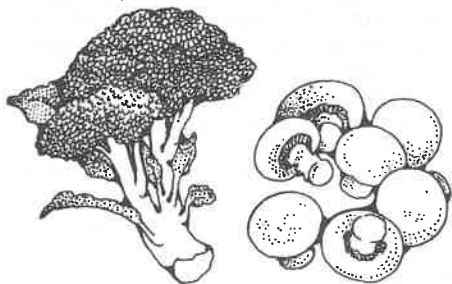
- 3 cups water
- 3 cups vinegar
- 1/3 cup salt
- 1 clove garlic, cut into 4ths
- 1 sprig fresh dill
- 1 or 2 small red hot peppers, optional



Wash and trim beans, drain. Pack lengthwise into clean quart jars. Put garlic and dill on top (also peppers if you want HOT beans). Bring water, salt and vinegar to a boil. Pour over beans and seal jars. Let stand at least four weeks. Place upside down for the first week. Use these dill beans with fresh vegetables and your favorite dip.

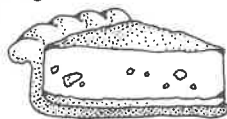

Main Course: BROCCOLI-MUSHROOM QUICHE



- 9" unbaked pie shell
- 1 egg white, slightly beaten
- 6 large mushrooms with stems
- 1 Tbsp. lemon juice
- 1/4 cup butter

- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 pkg. frozen chopped broccoli, thawed and drained
- 2 Tbsp. chopped parsley
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- dash pepper
- 1/2 lb. Swiss cheese, grated (2 cups)
- 4 eggs
- 1 1/2 cups half and half or light cream
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. nutmeg
- dash pepper



Brush inside of pie shell with egg white and refrigerate. Preheat oven to 375°. Wash mushrooms, remove stems and chop them coarsely. Toss with lemon juice. Saute mushroom caps in butter, stirring until tender (5 minutes). Drain on paper towels. In remaining butter in skillet, saute onion and mushroom stems. Stir for 5 minutes. Add broccoli, parsley, salt and pepper. Mix well. Spoon 1 rounded tablespoon of mixture into each mushroom cap. Sprinkle cheese over crust and then sprinkle mushroom mixture over cheese. In medium bowl, beat eggs, cream, salt, nutmeg and pepper with wire whisk or beater, just until blended. Do not allow to become frothy. Slowly pour into pie shell. Arrange stuffed mushrooms on top. Bake 40 to 45 minutes until puffy and golden. Cool for 10 minutes before serving.

COLOR COORDINATION & Other Wardrobe Tips

Beginning this month we bring you, in two parts, an article reprinted from "American Squaredance" Magazine copyright 1983 by Burdick Enterprises, Huron, Ohio. We think you'll find it interesting and informative.

At a recent special dance in Ohio, I overheard a conversation between two relatively new square dancers. It went something like this:

"I was going to purchase a new dress for this dance, but when I saw the price of dresses, I gave up that idea."

"I know what you mean," replied her friend.

This conversation prompted me to write this article, with the hope that I can make things a little easier for the new dancer. It will help all dancers with the problem of coordinating colors, sewing, and saving money.

You will find, if you begin your wardrobe with a few inexpensive solid color skirts (black, brown or white), and then choose a contrasting or complementary color for your blouse and petticoat, you will look charming.

Color coordinating, when done correctly, will always create a stunning outfit. Your blouse can also be worn with a suit or slacks thus stretching your budget even more.



However, if sewing just isn't for you, or you cannot sew, you can purchase lovely blouses in the department stores or square dance stores. They can be found in just about every color of the rainbow. Having to wash and iron a blouse is less work than ironing a dress, especially one smothered in ruffles.

Below, I have listed colors that will make each of the three basic skirts look fantastic.

A dark brown skirt will look terrific with apple green, pink, sky blue, champagne beige, peach, pale yellow, orange and/or white.

A black skirt is ravishing with apple green, red, pink, sky blue, champagne beige, peach, lemon yellow, white and/or black lace. Pastel multicolored petticoats are not at all practical. They do not go well with all colors as one would be led to believe.

A white skirt can be worn with just about everything, providing the material is heavy enough to keep the petticoat color from showing

through thus stealing some of the thunder away from an otherwise lovely white skirt.

Just remember, it is the combination of blouse and petticoat of the same color that will make your outfit stand out in a crowd.

Example: An apple green blouse, brown skirt and an apple green petticoat are extremely eye-catching, to say the least. On the other hand, a black blouse, white skirt, and green petticoat are really "nowhere".

From the dawn of antiquity, color has been a strong yet subtle force in shaping our human behavior. When selecting color, bear in mind that color does have a traumatic impact on how one feels.

Yellow will always lift your spirits and brighten up your day. Yellow will draw attention quicker than any other color.

Purple has a tendency to be depressing. This color, along with gold, stands for royalty. If you like purple, be sure to break it with another color. It can look very

attractive if trimmed with white, for example.

Red is a forceful color. This color indicates passion, drive and endurance. You will find nightclubs decorated with this color as it excites people.

Maroon shows stamina and strength.

Crimson shows the optimistic go-getter traits of red.

Pink shows love, rather than mere affection, and a willingness to serve and help others.

Green is a great color of nature. People preferring green are generally sympathetic and sentimental. They have a tendency to take life too easy. Green is slow to show anger.

Blue has a powerful vibratory influence. This color denotes sensitivity and fervor in a person very eager to do the right thing.

Violet can be depressing if one wears too much of this color. It is a color that denotes royalty and power.

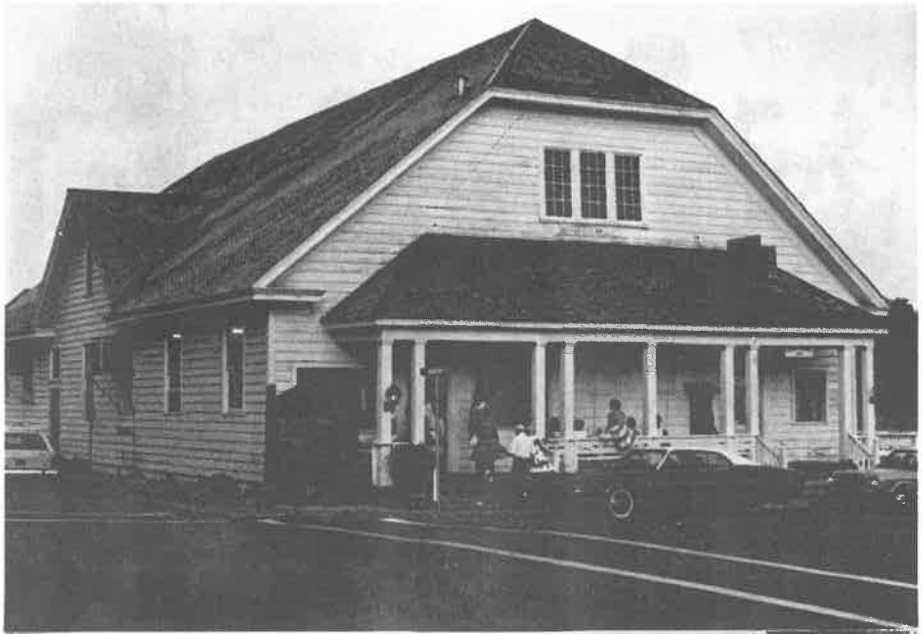
Dave and Suzanne Abbott's Dance Country is a square dance RV resort located at the foot of Mount Shasta in McCloud, California, midway between Redding and the Oregon state line. To quote the Dance Country flyer, "...McCloud is nestled on the south slope of Mt. Shasta, a company-built mill town dating back to the late 1800s. Its quaint character and much of its original architecture provide full services in a rural atmosphere."

From June through September, the Abbotts offer five day (Sunday through Thursday) dance packages featuring top national callers. Dance levels are specified for each week's package, with a choice of Mainstream, Advanced, or Challenge. Some weeks include intros to the next level. The packages include

morning and afternoon progressive square and round dance workshops, dances each evening, two buffet suppers, nightly "theme" after parties and a potluck picnic. (For the Sunday Buffet - for 150 people - 80 pounds of beef are placed in a deep pit barbecue at midnight Saturday and cooked until 4:00 p.m. on Sunday.)

Opened in 1979, Dance Country is really two facilities - a square dance hall located in McCloud, and an RV park about one mile from the hall.

The hall is located in an old cafeteria building. The wood floor is kept in perfect dancing condition and the hall is air-conditioned. The hall holds 18 squares comfortably and, because the dance packages are limited to that number, all dancers are assured of space to dance. There's a lounge, coffee and dining area at one end of the hall, with an "always on" coffeepot. The Abbotts even provide a cup rack where you can hang your coffee cup for the week.



The RV park includes 22 full hook-up sites, 12 spaces with water and electricity, and 34 with water only. Tent spaces are also available. Facilities include washing machines, dryers, restrooms with showers, telephones, and (because the fishing is so good) a fish cleaning sink.

The two hotels in McCloud are within walking distance of the hall,

but have rather limited amenities. There are also good motels and hotels in the town of Mt. Shasta, located on Interstate Highway 5, about 10 miles from McCloud.

Dave and Suzanne Abbott are delightful, accommodating people, keeping their fingers on the pulse of the entire operation. Every event happens exactly as programmed, and



on time. Suzanne is the organizer while Dave does the heavy work (he runs a mean backhoe!).

Dave occasionally joins the guest callers to harmonize on singing calls, and also does an excellent job of calling the squares and cueing the rounds on Friday and Saturday evenings. A caller since 1964, Dave travels throughout the western United States calling and teaching all levels from Beginner through A-2. Dave especially enjoys teaching beginner classes and enjoys watching their transformation from "civilians" to square dancers.

The local scenery is well worth a few extra days to explore. There

are three waterfalls along the McCloud River, and it's less than 40 miles to the spectacular Burney Falls. Mt. Shasta's snow trails are less than an hour's drive away.

For a fun square dance vacation at a reasonable cost, Dave and Suzanne Abbott's McCloud Dance Country is hard to beat.

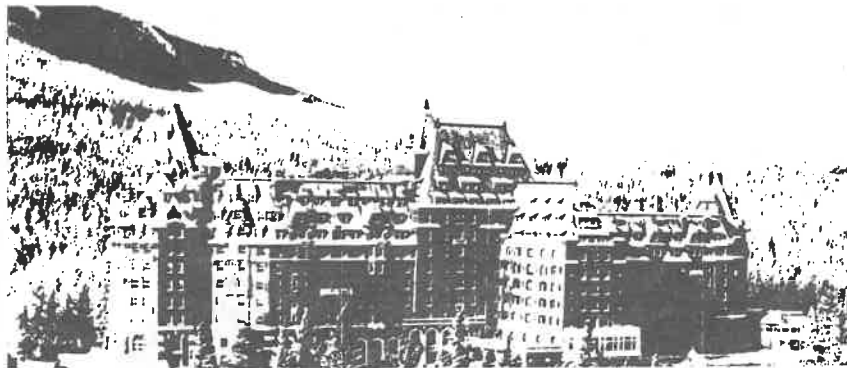

Everybody Talks About The Weather, But Nobody Does Anything About It...

For a number of months now, and even years, many local and national publications have contained articles on the problems facing today's square dance scene: Where are we going in the future? Why is the dropout rate so high? What can we do to save new dancers? Where can new dancers dance after class when the level of the club sponsoring the class is higher than the class graduating level? Where did the FUN go in square dancing? Why do we have all the new basics? Why do we have all of the old basics? Is the level system killing square dancing? Why do we have levels? Do we need levels?

This list of questions goes on and on — many pages have been written on these subjects, addressing them in one way or another. So far, not many pages have been written regarding concrete solutions and answers to the problems presented.

In the last few years, many organizations have been formed, both by dancers and callers, "to promote square dancing", "save square dancing", "reduce the number of basics", "standardize the basics", "standardize styling", "standardize levels", and so on. These basic problems seem to continue — as do the organizations who set out to solve them, but haven't. Most of

these organizations amount to the few dictating to the many. They have produced few solutions that have not created more problems than they have solved.

If I have your attention now, I would like to pause, from what will appear to be a scathing indictment of square dancing, to point out that I am a square dancer and a square dance caller and will continue to be. I do not want to see, as Ed Gilmore once said, square dancing get down to four couples and one won't be good enough, so the rest will have to quit. You may choose to disregard my opinion because I do more calling than dancing, and you can always say this is written from a caller's point of view. If you believe this, you might like to talk to the many dancers I have talked to. Their comments have prompted me to write this series of articles.

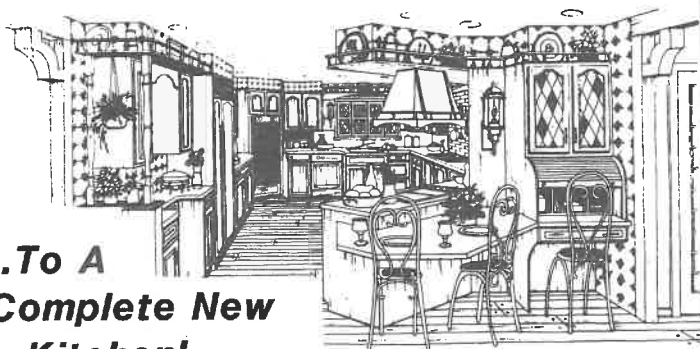
Recently, "The Callers Gazette", published by Hilton Audio Products, asked readers for feedback on how different clubs and callers were trying to solve the problem of giving new dancers a better chance to survive the transition from class to club dancing. (We have come a long way when we have to use words like survive or surviving in order to be a square dancer, haven't we?) Of the five responses

published, Dave Taylor's was the only one to mention, "classes are being taught with such intensity and so many basics". I feel the key words are "so many basics". More on that later.

Earl Johnston, in a recent issue of "News 'n Notes", mentioned a national Legacy poll that was answered by more than 5000 dancers. The most common answer to a question about what is happening to square dancing was that "it isn't as much fun as it used to be". He mentioned at the end of his commentary that we have tried APD and putting the DANCE back into square dancing and now DBD. Maybe we should make an effort to put the FUN back into square dancing. I agree. If we don't put some FUN into it again we may get to try NMD (that's NO MORE DANCERS).

While the primary thrust of these articles will be the subject of basics and the current number of same, many questions (and organizations) are so intertwined within the subject that it is difficult to understand possible changes without looking at where we came from and how we got to where we are today.

First, a brief word about several items which will be subjects of future articles. Organizations ... are usually formed by and for people who like to form and run organizations. A whole book could be written about the psychological motivations behind organizations and people who like to run them. We will leave that to others. Keep in mind that there were square dance callers and square dancers long before any organizations existed. Check your square dance history and you will see that this is true.

"To promote square dancing" ... Many, if not all square dance organizations have this high sounding purpose as part of the preamble to their by-laws. Promote to whom, I would ask? Check your local or national organization's annual budget and see how much money is used for promotion aimed at the non-dancing general public, where we get our new dancers. Also

check how much is being spent for promotion for themselves and other square dancers.

I discussed a plan with a national traveling caller years ago to really "promote square dancing". He agreed it would probably work, but didn't think we had enough capable callers to handle the dancers that would show up when the plan did work. I would like to face that problem rather than some I have faced in the past caused by organizations who are supposed to promote square dancing.

"Save square dancing" ... I think that square dancing may possibly need to be saved from those who are trying to save it. It will probably survive in spite of our best efforts to "save" it!

"Reduce the number of basics" ... That's a good one. That was probably written long before 1961, and there are a lot more basics a dancer must know today than when I learned to square dance in 1961, and learned to call in 1963.

"Standardize the basics" ... A good idea. You were waiting for a positive comment in all this? There's one.

"Standardize styling" ... Good idea, there's two.

"Standardize levels" ... Sorry, back to the negative. A good idea, but not as the levels exist today.

Now, back to Dave Taylor's "so many basics". For sometime now, this has been my thought also. We have so many basics now, and so many coming out quarterly, yearly, or whatever, that if you or I miss some dancing because of illness we can just kiss square dancing GOODBYE. We can't catch up easily, and we don't want to go through beginners class again, right? We go back to our club and feel like dummies because we don't know how to Divide to a Column, or Chain Down the Line, or whatever. We feel like idiots messing up the square for the other dancers. So, we become a member of that large club of DROPOUTS. Boy, would I like to have that club. It has more members than the sum total of all the current square dancers in the world today.

New basics don't contribute to dropouts, right? Let's consider for a moment the couple who danced well for five years. He was in an accident and couldn't dance for one year. She didn't dance during this time either. They were members of a Plus club and were among the strongest dancers in the group.

They returned to the club and attempted to get back into square dancing. However, they were faced with twelve figures they didn't know so, they joined the Dropout Club.

Note: While CALLERLAB does not always pick the full number of figures allowed for each quarter, they can pick up to six Mainstream Quarterly Selection figures and six Plus Quarterly Selections per year, for a total of twelve.

Any discussion of basics should start with some consideration as to how figures become basics in the first place. Many would feel that they are selected by some divine power and lightning will strike you if you don't learn to dance all of them. You won't "survive".

When I started dancing and calling there was a list of basics, much shorter than it is today. After attending a class for 16 to 20 weeks you were a square dancer. As is the case today, there were new figures written constantly by people who like to write new figures. They then got these published somewhere and hoped they turned out to amount to something (becoming basics, for instance).

Most clubs danced the "basic list" with some additional figures that were new or popular at the time. These were usually referred to as "experimentals". If a figure caught on with the dancers and callers, it usually evolved into a "basic". That is, it became acceptable to call that figure anywhere. Otherwise, it might be used at your club, but not at other dances. Gradually, through this process of evolution, the "basic list" kept getting larger until we reached the point we are at today. The above may be a little oversimplified, but it is generally the way most of today's list came about.

For a number of years B.C. (Before CALLERLAB), dancers began to complain about the number of basics required of them and the fact that some, although a minority, of callers were using figures at open dances that all dancers did not know. While the Double Chicken may have been popular in Petaluma, it was not known in San Diego and the dancers did not like this. Something had to be done to force judgment on these callers and to "save square dancing". Let's form an organization and fix the problem.

B.C., there were probably 75 figures you needed to know at "normal" club dances and hoedowns. There were also closed clubs that danced more figures than the 75. You had to go to a class to be considered for membership in most of the closed clubs. Probably, knowledge of about another 25-30 figures would put you in the really accomplished dancer groups.

Anyway, the list was getting too long. Let's reduce it and "save square dancing" and make everybody happy at the same time. First, we

created Mainstream, a list of 68 figures. That reduced the list. But did it? Look at the current Mainstream list with its numbered items and the multitude of letters under some of the "Family" names. You can readily see that, when taking into consideration the varying formations within some of the families, the Mainstream list contains many more basics than 68.

Take for example, the Circulate Family, Number 47. There are nine letters below the heading. Now I ask you, doesn't a Circulate from Waves feel different than a Split, Box, Column, or Two-Faced Line Circulate? Don't they all require teaching time and learning time for the callers and dancers? Isn't a Couples Hinge different from a Single Hinge and Partners Hinge? I really think they are! Therefore, they should have separate numbers.

The implication that these moves are a family, a close knit group almost similar, would seem to indicate that very little teaching would make you proficient at all of them once you learned one of them

-- and, therefore, they can be lumped into one number. Very clever! That's how we reduced the number of basics. But, who's kidding whom?

When I sat down and renumbered the current Mainstream list, giving consideration to the different formations, the feel of the figures, and the teaching time required for new dancers, I came up with approximately 103 numbers. Of course, in some areas, you must also know MSQS and Plus. This added 33 more figures for a total of 136. We really reduced that list, didn't we?

Many of the articles about saving square dancing, newer dancers, and lowering the dropout rate, really begin to make sense when you look at real numbers instead of fake numbers with a lot of letters below them.

What do dancers really think about all this? I have been asking them, and the answers vary, not surprisingly, from "give us more" to "give us less". We have places for those who want more in Advanced and Challenge. The difficulty seems to be for those who want less or can't handle more. They are the losers in our square dance picture today.

I have been taking a poll on dancers' opinions of the basics lately and, while the sample is small to date, The Prompter's annual dancer survey at this year's SCVSDA Jubilee in October will include questions on this subject. Speaking of the Jubilee, it's interesting to note that the committee has included a full

Mainstream program this year. They are to be congratulated for recognizing the importance of offering a program which includes all dancers.

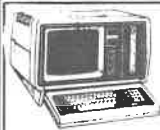
In order not to prejudice the answers to the upcoming poll, I will not print the results of my small poll at this time. I will, however, in future articles. Let me say in closing that the results of the small poll will "knock your socks off" if they are upheld by larger polls.

While the above may seem negative and taking a shot at everybody, it takes a shot at me, too. I have been a participant for many years. I also realize that reality is out there and many solutions to square dancing's problems have failed to consider reality at all.

The International Association of Round Dance Teachers

The ROUNDALAB daily two-hour educational seminars, organized by Education Chairman Don and Pete Hickman, at the National Square Dance Convention in Louisville, Kentucky, were held with overflowing attendance.

The ROUNDALAB seminars, which were primarily lecture with audience participation through question and answer periods, were slanted to round dance teachers, square dance callers interested in the round dance as a part of the overall square dance activity, and prospective teachers.

On Thursday, Pete Hickman moderated a leadership discussion with Ted and Barbara May and Don Hickman as panelists. Harmon Jorritsma, ROUNDALAB Chairman, stressed at the Friday session that ROUNDALAB is for all teachers and all phases of round dancing. He explained how ROUNDALAB is defining, in round dance terminology, all steps, figures, and movements currently known. A report of the progression of work being done on the phases of round dancing was also given. On Saturday afternoon, Irv and Betty Easterday incorporated their philosophy of teaching in a session entitled "Thinking About Teaching. Let's Learn to TEACH Round Dancing".

These seminars are not to be confused with the dancer clinics presented as a part of the overall general education program at a National Convention. ROUNDALAB's Educational Committee is planning similar, but more in-depth, discussions for teachers at its annual meeting in October in Indianapolis.

The seventh annual ROUNDALAB Convention will be held October 23-

25, 1983 at the Adam's Mark Hotel in Indianapolis, Indiana.

By meeting in different geographical locations, round dance teachers have an opportunity to attend at least one meeting every three years. Previous meetings have been in Salt Lake City, San Antonio, Philadelphia, San Diego, Kansas City, and Memphis.

It is at these ROUNDALAB conventions that members realize the importance of self-improvement and standardization of terminology as well as learn better ways to teach. Until a teacher has attended and participated in a ROUNDALAB meeting, the emphasis on teacher education does not become real.

Our Education Committee will present two different sessions: an in-depth study and discussion on our ROUNDALAB phases, including demonstrations of each definition; and a thorough discussion of the philosophy of education and teaching as related to the round dance profession. The goal of the Standardization Committee is to finish the terms that will complete Phases 1 through 4 and then, if time permits, work on Phases 5 and 6. Another committee is working hard to complete a plan to help interested callers introduce rounds into their programs. All committees will give reports and hold open meetings for the membership to attend.

While the annual ROUNDALAB Convention has no programmed round dancing at its meetings, the Indiana Round Dance Council will host a get-acquainted Round Dance Party on Saturday evening, October 22, prior to the opening session on Sunday.

UNITED SQUARE DANCERS OF AMERICA



At the Annual Meeting of the United Square Dancers of America, held in Louisville, Kentucky on June 25, 1983 and concurrently with the 32nd National Square Dance Convention, a new slate of officers was selected to head this organization.

Chosen to succeed Jim and Jan Maczko (California), who had served the USDA as its first President from the formation of the organization in 1981 until 1983, were Joe and Joy Vaccari of Fort Walton Beach, Florida. The Vaccari's have been active supporters of the USDA since its very inception, having served as Regional Directors of the Organizing Committee for the Formation of a National Square Dancers Association in 1980. They have held the position of Treasurer for the past two years and have also chaired a committee for the promotion of a Square Dance Commemorative Postage Stamp, as well as working with the USDA's Square Dancers Museum and Hall of Fame Committee. They have previously held numerous positions within the Florida Federation of Square Dancers, including president.

Continuing on the Executive Board for their third terms as Vice-Presidents are Jim and Peggy Segraves (Alabama), Central Region Vice-President; and Claude and Polly Potter (Colorado), Western Region Vice-President. Walter and Ruth Henderson (Pennsylvania) were re-elected to a second term as Eastern Region Vice-President. Also joining the board are Plains Region Vice-President Howard and Loraine Backus (Arkansas); Secretary Betty and Bob Coates (California); and Treasurer Ed and Mary Barbee (Texas).

Jim and Jan Maczko were appointed as Director of Information, and Walt and Esther Stoltz (Florida) as Historian. Parliamentarian Charles and Peggy Naddeo (California) will also continue as USDA Insurance Chairman. Other committee chairman include George and Judy Garland (North Carolina), Square Dancers Museum and Hall of Fame Committee; and Mac and Mary McClure (California), Ways and Means Committee Chairman.

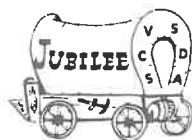

A vast number of ideas were presented indicating the tremendous potential these officers see for the continued development and growth of the USDA.

This meeting will afford the leaders of the USDA the opportunity to devote an entire weekend to the planning for the future of the square dance activity. Beginning with the 1984 Mid-Year Meeting, invitations will be extended to dancer leaders from throughout the area of the meeting.

Under the leadership of this group of officers and committee chairmen, the future of the United Square Dancers of America is secure.

THE NFDC IS PROUD TO ANNOUNCE — Senate Bill S1448 was introduced June 10, 1983 by Senator Robert C. Byrd (Senate Minority Leader), West Virginia, with 27 co-sponsors including Senator Howard Baker (Senator Majority Leader), Tennessee, and Senator Strom Thurmond (Chairman Judiciary Committee), South Carolina.

S1448 is identical to HR1706 introduced February 28, 1983 by Congressman Norman Y. Mineta, California.

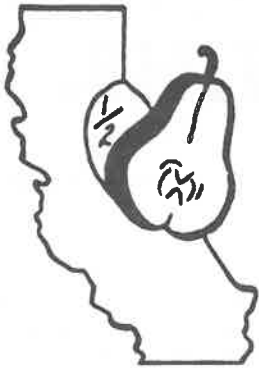
STATUS UPDATE: S1448 is in the Senate Judiciary Committee and has 31 co-sponsors. There should be 51 co-sponsors for a Senate vote. Both California Senators are co-sponsors. HR1706 is in the House Sub-

Committee for Census and Population and has 123 co-sponsors. We must have a total of 218 co-sponsors for a House vote.

MORE GOOD NEWS!! Congresswoman Katie Hall, Indiana is now the Chairwoman of the Subcommittee for Census and Population; she replaces Congressman Robert Garcia, New York. Mrs. Hall was a co-sponsor of HR1706 at the time of her appointment.

Let's all get busy and get co-sponsors for both bills so that the "Square Dance" will be permanently designated the "National Folk Dance of the United States".

piece (which we had not reported as missing!) showed up, and we never were able to figure out where it had been or how the airline knew it was ours.

Two more things before I get to the "dumb" story. In this issue, check out our classified column for solo dancers seeking partners for workshops, classes, etc. — "Pair Off". We've had so many requests for advertising of this nature, we thought we'd give it a try. Also, please note that Bob Southern will not be writing his "Challenge Corner" for a few months and, instead, will be writing a featured series of articles on problems facing today's square dance scene.

Now, about editors who do dumb things. While on Maui, we went square dancing with the Maui Mixers in the town of Kahului, about 40 miles from Kaanapali, where we were staying. (Boy, were we unhappy! But then again, it did give us something to do while we waited that long hour. H.)

Then, of course, we discovered that the funnel was a bit short. The cover from a copy of The Prompter (what else!) made a suitable extension and we were soon on the road again. (But what happened to dinner? — all the restaurants closed at 10 o'clock, too! H.)

MAINSTREAM (from page 16)

All Trade calls involve a "right shoulder passing action". Immediately upon hearing the 'Trade the Wave' call, take at least a half step forward such that you can determine if you were the Beau (left-side dancer) or the Belle (right-side dancer) in your wave — Belle dancers always have 'the right-of-way' when executing Trade (or trading) calls. In both examples shown, the ladies are the Belle dancers; and will Trade closest to the center of the formation, while the Men (Beaus) will 'take the wider (or outside) trading path'.

If you start as a center, you must finish the Trade the Wave call as an end; and you must be in 'an opposite-hand' wave. So, ends become centers and centers become ends; and right-hand waves become left-hand waves or left-hand waves become right-hand waves. In short, everything that can change — does change.

One of the main secrets to Trade the Wave is — don't RUSH the call. It is supposed to take 6 beats to accomplish — and dances extremely well using that timing.

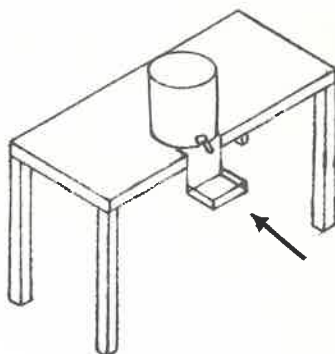
