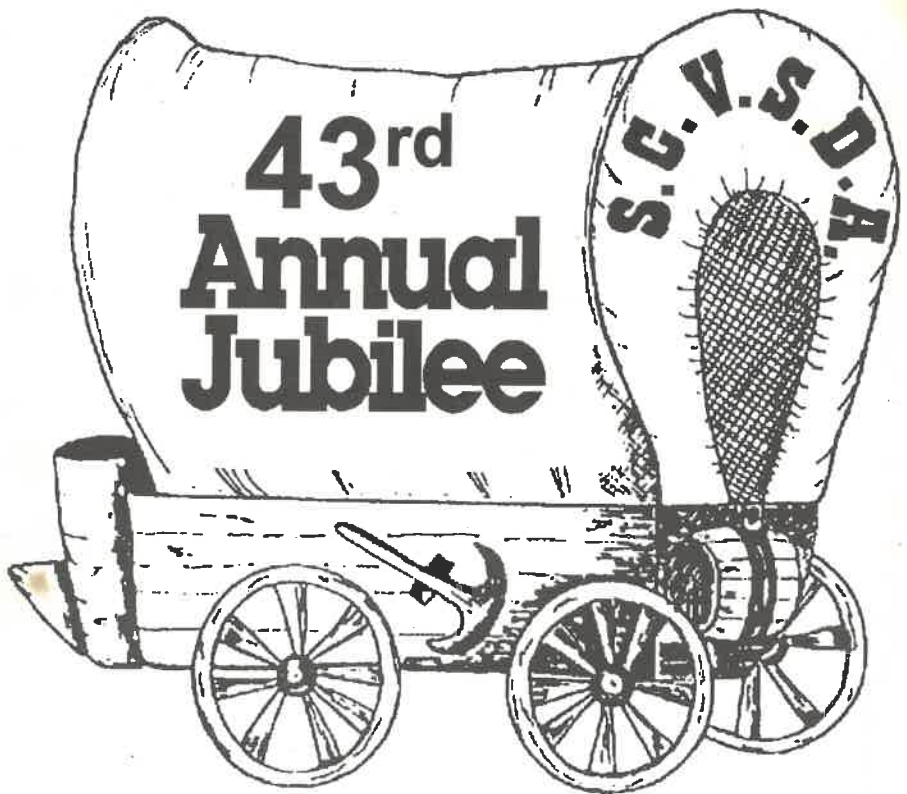

Cowpokes - Western Nicknames

Billy the Kid...Wild Bill...Black Bart... Butch & Sundance...

Western heroes had colorful nicknames, but they weren't all as complimentary as they sound. Here's some information on a few of the names.

William "Billy the Kid" Bonney looked like a kid.

Henry "Billy the Kid" McCarty looked like a goat.

James Butler "Wild Bill" Hickok had a long nose and a protruding lip, and was originally named **"Duck Bill"**.

Charles E. "Black Bart" Boles came up with the name himself. He became a stagecoach robber by accident. Originally a schoolteacher in northern California's gold country, Boles had a friend who was a Wells Fargo stagecoach driver and decided to play a trick on him. One day in 1875 he covered his face with a scarf, found a stick about the size of a pistol, and jumped out in front of the coach hoping to scare his friend. To his surprise, the driver threw down the strongbox and rode off before Boles could tell him it was only a joke. Opening the strongbox, Boles discovered a fortune in gold coins and bullion. Realizing there was more money in stick-ups than education, Boles quit his teaching job and began holding up stagecoaches full time. He robbed 28 stagecoaches between 1875 and 1883.

Robert LeRoy "Butch Cassidy" Parker, as a teenager, idolized a criminal named Mike Cassidy, and eventually began using his friend's last name as an alias. He picked up the name "Butch" while working in a Rock Springs, Wyoming butcher shop.

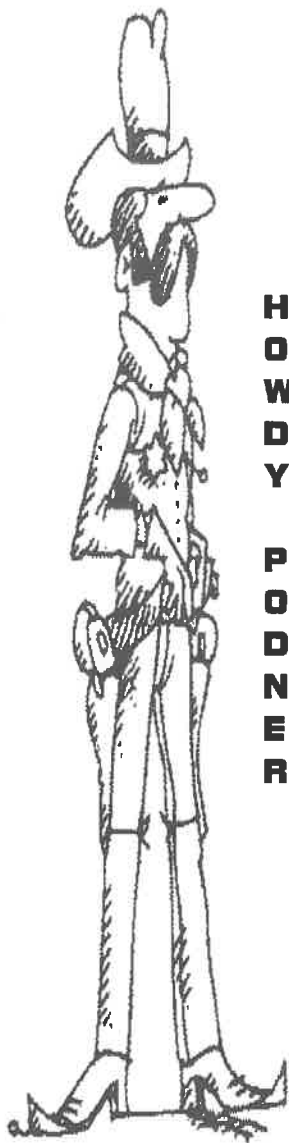
Harry "The Sundance Kid" Longabaugh, as a teenager, during the 1880's spent 1-1/2 years in the Sundance Jail in Wyoming, serving out a sentence for horse stealing.

William "Bat" Masterson, the famous sheriff of Ford County, Kansas, hit more lawbreakers over the head with his cane than he shot with his gun, and earned the nickname "Bat".

John "Doc" Holliday, a professional dentist by trade, only became a gunslinger and professional gambler after a bout with tuberculosis which forced him to move west in search of a drier climate. Even at the height of his criminal career, he practiced dentistry part-time.

Al & Frank Jennings, the dumbest train robbers in the West, tried to rob a mail car on the Santa Fe, but the conductor chased them away. Two weeks later the brothers tried to stop another train by blocking the track with railroad ties, but the train steamed right through the barrier. In another attempt, they tried to dynamite open two safes, but only succeeded in blowing up the boxcar the safes were on.

Chuckwagon Cookin'

OK Corral Beef Chili

6 dried Ancho chilies*
3 ½ cups boiling water
3 lbs boneless beef chuck
4 cloves garlic, crushed
3 bay leaves, crumbled
2 to 4 tblsp chili powder
Salt to taste
6 cups hot, cooked rice

Remove stems from chilies; remove seeds; chop coarsely; place chilies in bowl; cover with boiling water; steep 30 minutes. Meanwhile, cut beef into ½-inch cubes; heat oil in Dutch oven; add half the beef cubes; cook until browned on all sides; remove to plate. Add remaining beef cubes; cook until browned on all sides; add 1* batch back to pan. Strain chilies; reserve liquid & chilies. Stir 2 ½ cups of liquid from chilies into browned beef; stir in garlic & crumbled bay leaves; heat to boiling; reduce heat & cook over medium-low heat, partially covered for 1 hour, stirring occasionally. Place soaked chilies, remaining liquid & chili powder in blender container; cover; blend until smooth; stir into beef mixture. add salt to taste; cook over medium heat, stirring often for 30 minutes or until beef is tender. If a thicker chili is desired, gradually stir in 3 tblsps cornmeal, cook, stirring constantly, until thick & mixture boils; remove from heat; serve over hot, cooked rice.

*Ancho chilies are sweet & fairly mild. In this recipe they give the chili a rich, dark color & provide a unique, slightly spicy flavor.

Note: After working with any chilies, wash hands with warm, soapy water. Avoid touching face or eyes. Said editor got the chilies on her eyelid one time & had to jump in the shower (clothes & all) & spray her face with cool water until the burning stopped. Needless to say, she never touched her face again working with chilies!

Blazing BBQ Beans

1 lb pinto *beans; cold water
2 large onions, chopped
2 cloves garlic, crushed
1 jar (12 oz) chili sauce
1 can (7 oz) diced green chilies
2 tblsp chili powder
2 beef bouillon cubes
2 tsp salt

Place beans & 2 quarts water in Dutch oven; let stand at room temperature at least 6 hours or overnight; drain & rinse; add 1 ½ quarts water to beans; heat to boiling; stir in remaining ingredients; cover; cook over low heat 2 hours or until beans are tender. Makes 2 quarts.

*Beans may be prepared by quick soaking method (This eliminates a lot of the "gas" problem, or, take Beano): Place beans & 2 qts hot water in Dutch oven; heat to boiling; cook 2 minutes; let stand at room temperature 1 hour; drain, rinse & proceed with recipe.

Lone Ranger Cornbread

1 cup flour; 1 cup cornmeal
2 tblsp sugar (optional)
2 tblsp baking soda
¾ tsp salt
2 cups buttermilk
1 egg, beaten
1 tblsp butter, melted
Heat oven to 400 degrees.
Mix flour, cornmeal, sugar, soda & salt; mix buttermilk & egg; stir buttermilk mixture & butter into cornmeal until blended. Grease cornstick pans or muffin tins; fill each section 1/3 full; Bake 10-15 minutes for cornstick pans; 15-20 minutes for muffin tins.
Yields 21 cornsticks; 14 muffins.
(Increase recipes according to how many cowpokes are riding in for grub).

The Chuckwagon

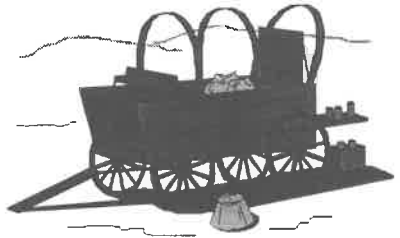
Chuckwagon cooking meant hearty meals with lots of beef to keep cowboys healthy and strong during the long cattle drives. Cattle drives began in the 1860s to bring beef from the West to the Kansas railroad lines and from there to America's growing eastern cities.

The Mexican flavor in chuckwagon cooking was brought to the Southwest by Mexican cowboys, who introduced many of the cattle herding techniques and tools still used today.

In 1866 when Charles Goodnight began herding his longhorns north from Texas to the Kansas railheads, he had to find a way to feed his men. He bought an Army supply wagon, rigged the back end with a box he built for food, and hired the best cook around.

The **chuckbox** was the "business end" of the wagon. The compact drawers stocked all of the food staples, spices, coffee, shaving supplies and the cook's secret drawer where he hid his "hooch" used for "medicinal purposes". A hinged worktable folded down from the front of the **chuckbox** where all of the meal fixins were in easy reach.

Riding, roping, branding and keeping the temperamental cattle rolling from sunup to well past sunset made for long days, weeks, and months for cowboys on the open range. Trail driving demanded a certain spirit and unlimited stamina of cattleherders, which has remained as part of the myth and romance of the western cowboy.



Roundups were hard work, but also social events for cowboys – often bringing together over a hundred men from a dozen ranches. Cowhands had a chance to gather around the **chuckwagon** to share good grub and friendly campfire chatter.

Cowboys were well-fed during the roundups. Much of the men's energy came from beef which was served three times a day at some camps. The **chuckwagon** "cookies" had a chance to show their stuff in good-natured competition with other cooks, as these large roundups required several chuckwagons to feed the hungry hired hands. The **chuckwagon** and its "cookie" was a home for cowboys on the lonely, open range. A cook who fixed good meals boosted the cowboys' morale and work on the long drives.

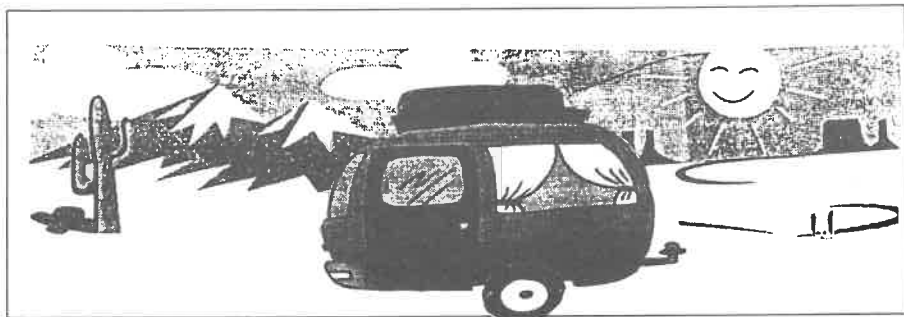
Beef was the mainstay for cowboys on the range. They ate their steaks skillet fried and enjoyed hearty chili and beef stews which were cooked in Dutch ovens over open campfires. A cook's recipes had to be easy to fix on short notice for large troops of men on the move. You might say the **chuckwagon** cook was the West's original short-order chef.

The era of the long cattle drives to the railheads was ended abruptly after only 30 years by the advent of wire fences dividing the land.

Cowboys today still have the fierce spirit and pride in their hard work, like the cowboys of a century ago. Many of the chores done today – roping, branding, herding and roundups – are still done as they were a hundred years ago, but there have been changes. Trucks are now used to transport cattle, ending the long herd drives and making remote camps a thing of the past.

Chuckwagons are still used to feed the men, but the chuckwagon of today is often a pickup truck with meals prepared on the tailgate or on a barbecue grill.

The food fixed on today's **chuckwagon** includes authentic chuckwagon recipes passed down through the years from cooks and cowboys. The men still delight in hearty meals with lots of beef, beans and biscuits – all foods that build strength.



YOUR ROVING CORNERS

After enjoying the Nationals in Indianapolis, then USAWest in Las Vegas, we enjoyed dancing with local clubs in Minneapolis and Rapid City. We found no other clubs until we reached West Yellowstone, Montana. Outside West Yellowstone there is an RV park called Lionshead that is a lovely square dance resort. All summer they have square dancing with a series of callers. There is also a resident caller. The area is high (6500') mountainous, and scenic. They have a successful and popular place. We recommend it.

Every Labor Day, in West Yellowstone there is the "Knothead Jamboree," so called because someone once said, "Only a Square Dance Knothead would come all the way to West Yellowstone to dance." We are Knotheads. We will go nearly anywhere to dance, so we came! With Deborah Parnell and Jon Jones, how could we miss? From the trail-in dance on Friday until the last-chance dance on Monday afternoon it was great. Good crowd, congenial people, great weekend! What a great end-of-summer party!

Deborah shared with us her ideas about promoting square dancing. She says that square dancing is a near perfect activity combining physical exercise, social interaction, and FUN! Unfortunately, it is not being marketed well, and unless that changes, will continue to drop in numbers until it dies.

Well, it probably won't die for a long time, but dancers do not last forever. They move, get married, change jobs, get old, and sometimes pass away. As a volunteer activity if we do not recruit we will cease to exist.

One way some groups are having success is taking a booth at whatever community activity that is going, from art shows to rodeos to fairs to whatever you can think of. A big banner says "Learn to Square Dance." Dancers operate the booth in shifts, meeting and greeting the public and passing out square dance literature. They ask each person who stops to sign a register with name, address and telephone number so "we can send you some more information." Promise that the list will never leave square dancing and that no one will knock on their door and that *no one will try to sell them something*.

This database is entered and divided among clubs that are running classes. Now here is the critical part:

1. Three weeks before class is due to start, send them a warm personal letter inviting them to class. Be sure to include location, time, and a contact person.
2. Two weeks before class is to start, send another letter.
3. One week before class is to start, send a third letter.



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4. Three days before class is to start, call them up, offer to meet them at class, or give them a ride, or show them the dance location.

5. Assign each new couple a "buddy angel" who will be their special contact in the club, to answer questions, to dance with them, to be sure they make it to newer dancer hoedowns, and so forth. In short, bond with them, and help bond them to square dancing.

If a club will follow these procedures, it will grow. Most important is to be seen, go public,

make that initial contact, get those addresses and telephone numbers.

Don't let up! Keep doing demonstration dances, dance for street fairs, art shows, and anywhere that will give you an audience. Show people what fun square dancing really is and what enthusiastic, fun people are in square dancing.

Remember the old cowboy saying: **TIMING HAS A LOT TO DO WITH THE OUTCOME OF A RAIN DANCE!**

Each of the last 3 articles by the Committee to Promote Square Dancing outlined key points in our efforts to attract and retain dancers. The first one outlined our strategy to **FIND 'EM, HOOK 'EM, and KEEP 'EM!** The next article described our strategy to market what the public wants-**MULTI-CYCLE CLASSES, CENTRALIZED CLASSES, and 16 WEEK SEGMENTED CLASSES.** And the last article described some of the requirements to **FOLLOW UP WITH INTERESTED DANCERS.** By the time this article is published we will have a very good feel about the success of our marketing efforts.

When this Committee was first formed, we committed to provide all data in the Prompter. And so this article summarizes our current Income and Expense status and our future plans. **Please call me (408-274-3770) or e-mail (vansymons@aol.com) any questions or comments.**

1. INCOME. As of 8/26 our total income is \$13,374.89. Fifty dollars was a donation to open our checking account with Downey Savings, \$3,953 was raised at the February Benefit Dance, \$7112.64 was raised at the May Grand Finale, \$1625.65 was raised at the Mike Sikorsky Benefit, and \$634 was raised at the August Rafter Rocker/Gadabout Benefit Dance.

2. EXPENSE. Note that 2 items are essentially a non-expense and are not included in our cost data-Keith Ferguson donated the cost of the halls for our February and May dances and Byron Yoshimura donated hundreds of flyers and handouts. Our total promotion expenses for the September classes totaled \$8007 (\$4040 for KRTY ads, \$1000 for KLIV ads, \$1920 for Century theater ads, \$1040 for VALPAC

ads to 45,000 homes, and \$7 for square dance business cards). Our total miscellaneous costs were \$330.41 (\$186.75 to file with the IRS and the Franchise Tax Board and \$143.66 for the August dance-hall rental and food).

3. BALANCE. Since there is no more funds required for our September classes, the current balance of \$5037.48 is available for our January and May classes. No final determination of how to finance these promotions will be made until the final data is available.

4. FUTURE. The Committee feels that this type of promotion will provide an important step in changing the image of square dancing and will provide a "jump start" to obtain names of interested dancers. We are working with the SCVSDA to determine ways to raise a nominal sum of about \$4-5000/year that would be used strictly for promoting square dancing. The reason for reducing the amount required is twofold. The first is called "leveraging." If our clubs do a good job of "mentoring" their new dancers, these dancers will bring in 2 or 3 or more friends and they will bring their friends, etc (the same way we all did it). Second, our demonstration dance teams plan to dance for large groups that come to watch and learn (gated communities, church groups, etc). This creates a significant opportunity to attract many people to square dancing.

In summary, this has been a superb effort by many people to "do something positive for square dancing." It's also brought many of us together in a cooperative effort, and it's changed the way we market square dancing. The Committee to Promote Square Dancing sincerely hopes that every club benefits from this effort.

Is a friend you haven't met.



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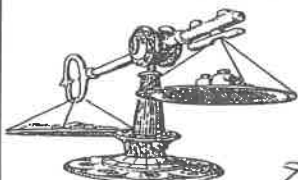
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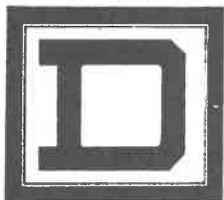
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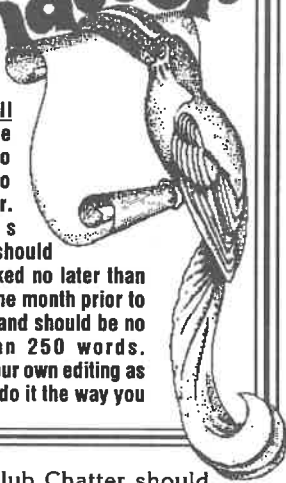
